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Science Program Names Physicist

An associate professor of physics at the University has been announced as one of 20 regional consultants in the American Association for the Advancement

of Science program. E. G. Ebbighausen will participate in the program which aims at increasing the number of well-qualified

science and mathematics teachers at the secondary school level.

Ebbighausen will be available to visit, on invitation, any college or university in Oregon, Washington and Idaho. He will meet with staff members in education and science in the institutions to consider problems in teacher education, and he will assist in co-ordinating closer working relationships with teachers of secondary schools.

Ebbighausen will provide the leadership in working out ways to interest more young people in careers in science and mathematics, and will cooperate with other regional consultants in the exchange of these ideas.

The AAAS program, known as the Science Teaching Improvement Program, was established to work in the high schools of certain pilot states. The new program for regional consultants is for service in colleges and universities, and is made possible by a grant from the General Electric Education and Charitable Fund.

Mike Zimmerman is presently taking the AS II Air Force program here, and is a sophomore in liberal arts.

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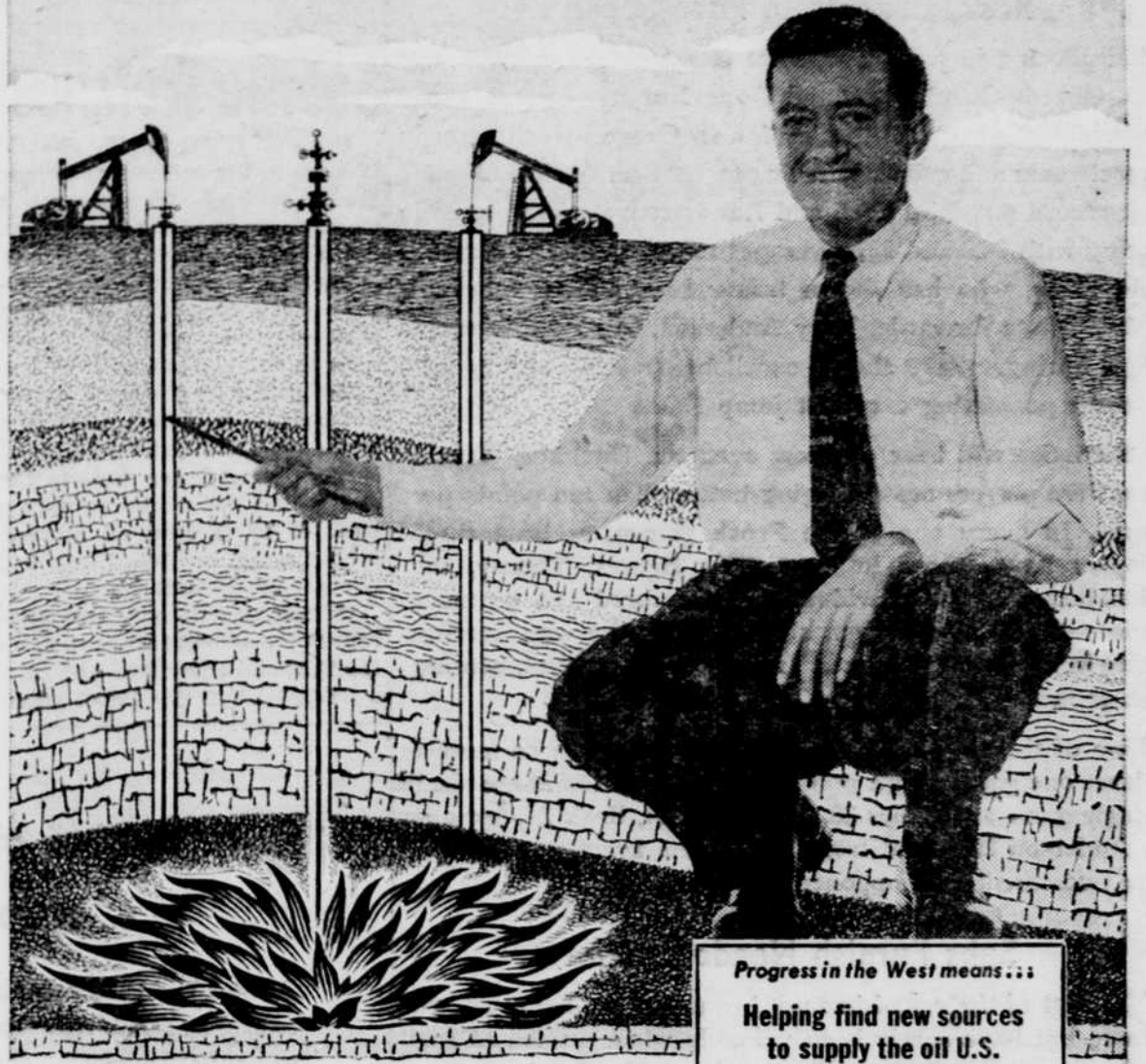
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
