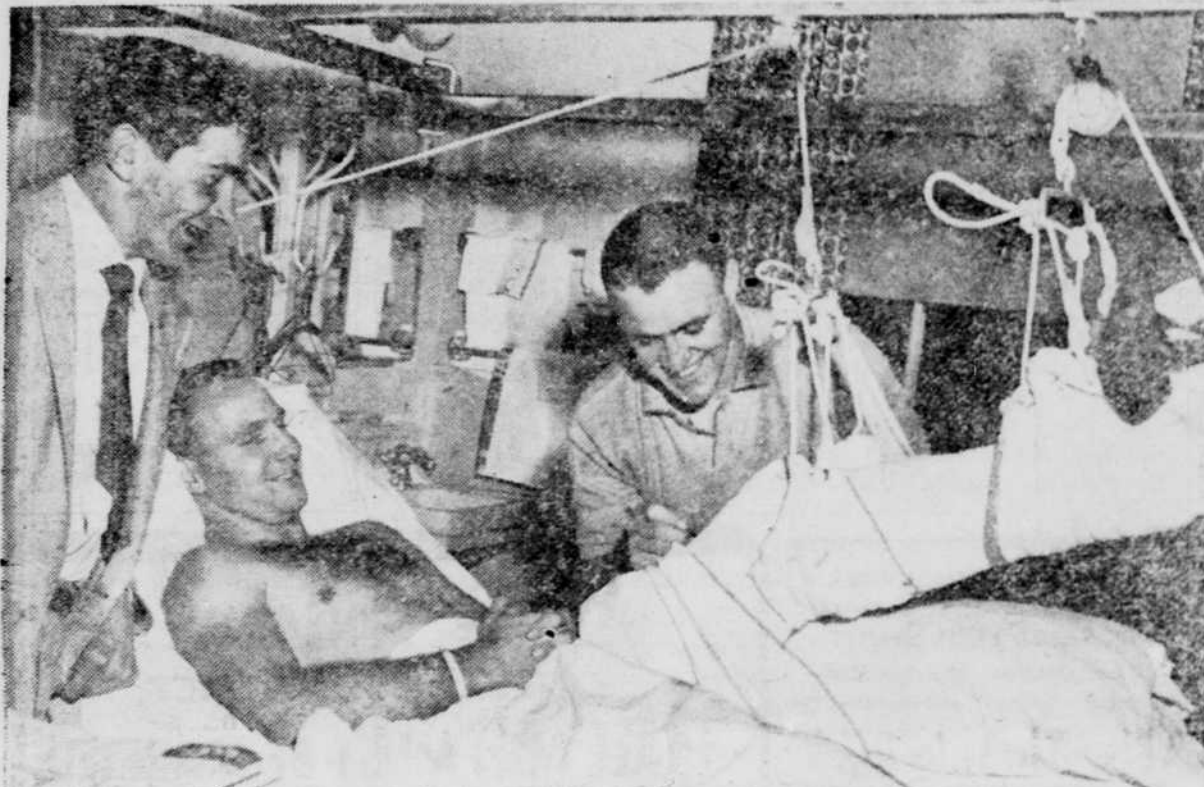

listened to fraternity presidents describe recent unfair persecution, and ignored the uproar.

Over in Johnson Hall, the "executives" had not yet arrived for work when this correspondent checked at 10 a. m. But secretaries were busy throwing furniture out of Former President Wilson's office to make room for the new "strong man," whoever he may be. Meanwhile gladhanding Tommy Thompson, who believes in good public relations and "if you can't lick 'em, join 'em" had set up a stand to shine combat boots for revolutionary troops.

Emerald Charged

Realizing the need for control of the campus propaganda machine, Col. Mauney ordered a bloody charge on the Emerald office, where the editorial board was in its Ivory Tower composing an anti-spring term blast. Pretty friendly to the revolution and freshman women in general, the dirty yellow rag was turned

over to Col. Mauney and the staff retired to the Riviera. Roy W. Adams was named editor, managing editor and military analyst for the crusading journal, the Oregon Yearly Ephemerald.
