Emerald Editor:

At the great risk of incurring the displeasure of the many and assorted canine lovers on this campus, I feel steps must be taken about the presence of dogs in the Student Union.

I am particularly concerned, of course, with their presence in the fishbowl; although dogs anywhere in the building are pretty rough to handle. I have been concerned with this for the last two years; however, in the last three or four months, the problem has become far more acute and yesterday, Wednesday, 27 March, was the crowning blow with at least two dog fights that I witnessed in the fishbowl and I assume there were probably more.

It is not, of course, the dog fights alone which are a problem. These dogs, evidently, have had very poor training and are not house broken. At the risk of appearing crude, I can verify the fact that they are not house broken as far as marble and metal columns, table legs, chair legs and assorted and sundry objects.

Were we a commercial restaurant we would not be allowed to operate with dogs in the building. The Lane County Public Health Authorities would slap a closure on us immediately. Quite frankly, unless something is done about keeping dogs out of this building we are probably going to have to take the steps ourselves.

I think you can appreciate the difficulty we have in controlling the presence of dogs. We would have to have eight men on duty at all times to guard all doors and unless all are guarded any preventive measure seems pretty futile. Since I am a confirmed dog lover myself, I hesitate to call on the city of Eugene dog pound to pick up dogs off the campus.

If these were stray dogs this would be my first reaction; however, all of these dogs or virtually all of them are house pets or personal pets of someone who is on the campus. For this reason, I believe, it would be possible for the living organizations and the students of the University to do something themselves about keeping dogs out of the Student Union.

I feel that this matter is a real problem and one which drastic steps will have to be taken to correct unless we can get cooperation on the part of all students. If every student would make sure he doesn't let a dog in the door as he enters the building there would be no problem. I think, however, the real solution lies in the cooperation of the living organizations—keeping their dogs off the campus and more particularly out of the Student Union.

ADVICE ON ADVISORS

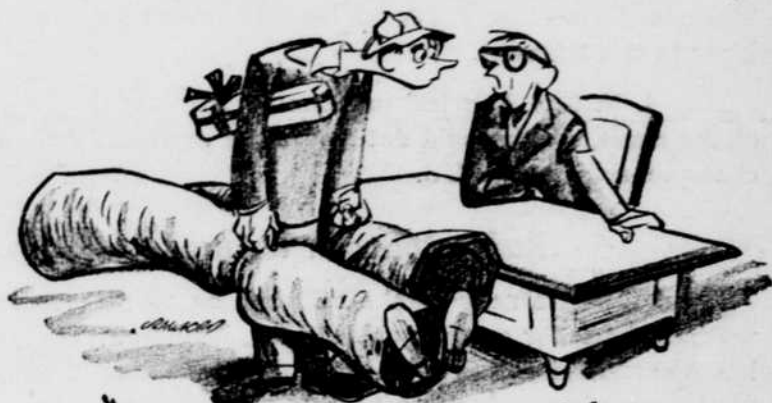
