Mrs. Carroll was accompanying her husband and Brewster Wilson, another victim, of Portland, Ore., on a motor trip across the desert to inspect a U.S. aid project when they were ambushed. Mayor Shrunk's Plea Postponed on Charges

PORTLAND (AP)—Mayor Terry Shrunk was arraigned in circuit court Thursday on charges of bribe-taking and perjury but his plea was put off until April 12.

The mayor's attorney, Raymond Kell, told Judge Charles W. Redding that Shrunk feels "that as a public officer his trial should be expedited." However, he asked that time for entering a plea be set back until Shrunk gets a trial lawyer.

Kell, who was the mayor's campaign manager last year, said that while he would not be the trial lawyer he could advise the court that Shrunk "does not intend to raise a lot of technical objections" when time comes to make his plea of guilt or innocence.

April 12 also was set for the plea of Joseph P. McLaughlin, Seattle, charged with conspiracy and extortion in allegations he and Teamster Union officials conspired to control the pinball industry.

The charges against Shrunk—as well as those against McLaughlin and a host of others—were aired in a Senate subcommittee hearing at Washington into labor racketeering.

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Ugly Man Hopefuls Needed for WUS

The contest will be similar to that of previous years. A picture of each candidate will be placed in the Student Union with the traditional milk bottle beneath it. The candidate who receives the most WUS donations will be announced as this year's Ugly Man during Duck Preview Weekend.

The entire WUS drive will begin April 15, with solicitations coming from the Eugene business area as well as the campus.

Oregon's WUS is continuing the rivalry with OSC by again setting its goal slightly higher than the \$1700 raised by Oregon State last term. Oregon's goal points towards the \$1800 mark.

Living organizations are urged to keep this goal in mind and save toward the WUS auction and Money Mile, as well as the Ugly Man contest. All three functions will be held during Duck Preview.

Aid for Nepal

The University's contribution to WUS this year will be divided, with half going into the WUS general fund and half being used specifically to assist in the construction of a dormitory in Katmandu, Nepal.

Formed after the First World War, WUS "has grown into a world-wide operation of students and professors battling against ignorance and need on an international scale."

Today, the program is concentrated in Asia where WUS feels the need is the greatest. Among many advancements WUS lists the construction of Student Health Centers, the establishment of libraries and laboratories, and the provision of scholarships and loan funds.

Essays on Freedom Due for Contest

Essays on "The Foundations and Safeguards of Our Basic Freedoms" for the \$1000 cash prize awarded by Claude and Elizabeth Robinson are due Monday, April 15. Entries may be submitted by any upper division or graduate student in the University.

Rules governing the entries are: that they be a maximum of 5000 words and that they be entered in triplicate, typewritten, and double spaced with adequate margins.

Papers may be turned in at any time to the committee, composed of C. Ward Macy, head of the economics department; Orlando J. Hollis, school of law; J. M. Fokett, acting head of the sociology department; Waldo Schumacher, acting head of the political science department; and Victor P. Morris, dean of the school of business administration.

Claude Robinson, donor of the award, is now president of Opinion Research Corporation of Princeton, New Jersey. Throughout his business career he and his wife have been helpful in many University projects.

State Law Leaders To Meet Students

The twelve members of the Board of Governors of the Oregon State Bar will hold their regular meeting here today and Saturday. They will visit the law school and meet with the faculty and law students to explain the activities of the Oregon State Bar and the work of the Board of Governors, according to O. J.
