The junior class' balding speedster clipped off a 9.8 100 for a win in this event and an exceptional time for this early in the season. The Frosh had reason to be proud of their entry in this race, for little Jim Norval from Salem finished a half-stride in back of Morris in :09.85.

Hard-working senior Doug Basham sailed over the high hurdles in :14.8 in the opening heat of the high sticks for his best time in this event. Freshman Dave Edstrom was given the same time in a near-dead heat. Basham went on to win the final in :15 flat.

Grelle Stays with Bailey

Long-striding soph Jim Grelle of Portland stayed right with Olympian Jim Bailey in the 880-yard run, both hitting the tape at the same time. Bailey and Grelle were clocked in the fast time of 1:56.0.

Junior Sam Whitney and second year man Jack Burg tied in the pole vault at 13 feet six inches. Pedigo, the broad jump winner, leaped out 23 feet, 1-2 inches for his triumph.

Arden Christensen, runner-up in the N. D. 440 last season, raced to an easy win in the quarter in :50.6. Sophs Bernie Ingley, Jerry Schwarz, and Jerry Christian trailed Arden to the wire in that order.

Defending division champ Ed Bingham out-threw all javelin entrants with a toss of 185 feet, 8 inches, and promising sophomore Mark Robbins clipped off

Masters Winner Cans Lucky Shot

AUGUSTA, Ga., April 7—Doug Ford, the new Masters champion, is a moon-faced gambler of the links who acknowledges, "I'm not one to play it cautiously."

While other leader contenders were pampering the tough Augusta National course with cozy shots, Ford went for the pins with pirate daring to capture one of the game's most coveted prizes.

"I guess you might say I play aggressive golf," he added.

Ford said he thought the winning shot of the tournament was not his spectacular blast out of a trap on the final hole for a birdie three, but his approach shot on the 520-yard, par five 15th.

"My caddy, Frank Jenkins, told me I ought to play it safe and not try for the green for fear of going into the water," Doug said. "I disagreed with him. I said, 'Frank, this is the ball game.'"

"I took out my spoon and let one fly. Well, I hit 40 feet from the pin and got down in two for a birdie four. I think that's where I won the tournament."

Ford's grandfather was an Italian immigrant railroad man named Fortunato, his father a golf pro who later had the family name changed to Ford.

The Huskily-built, 34-year-old Ford grew up in teeming New York City, went to public schools there and once thought he'd try for the New York Yankees or Giants.

"We lived only a mile from the Polo grounds," he said. "I played third base and was a teammate of Buddy Kerr, who became a major leaguer. I thought several times I'd try out but didn't."

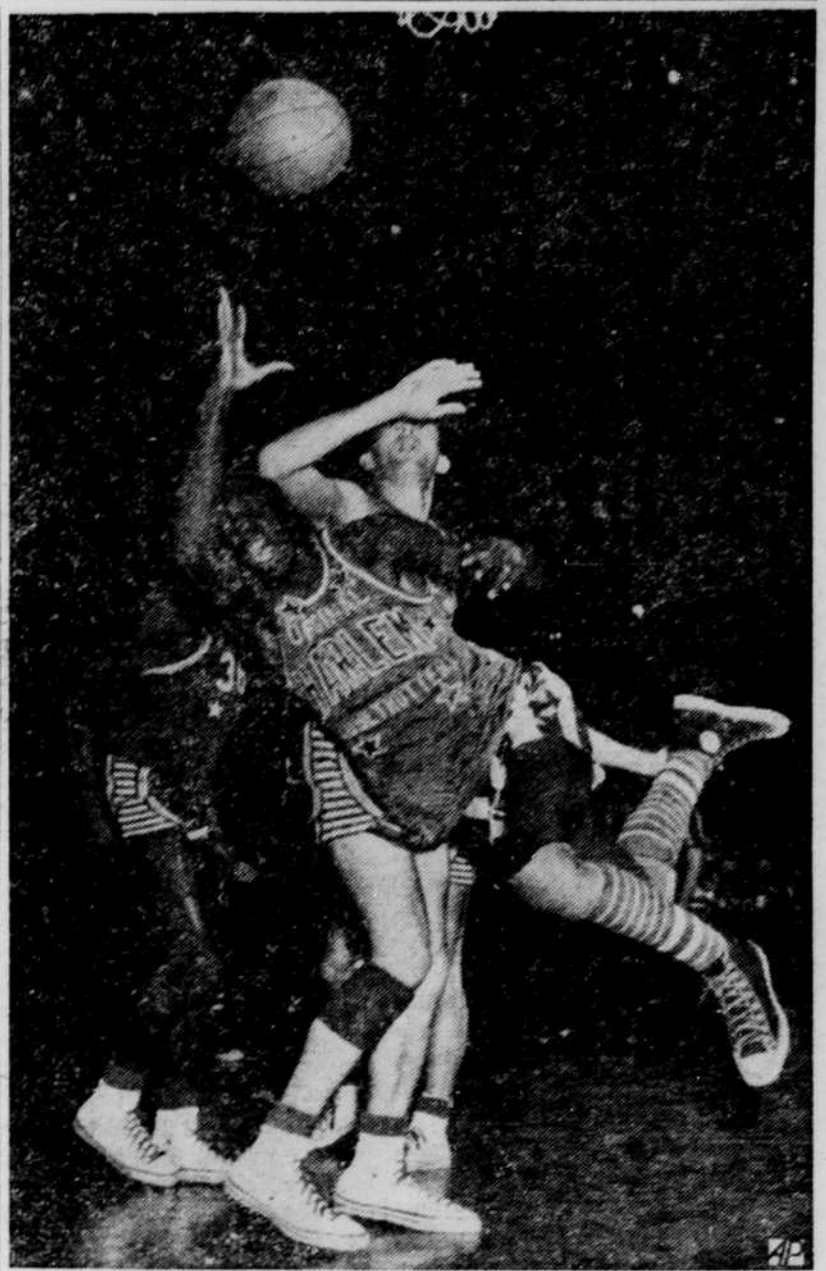
After graduation from George Washington high school, he was offered a scholarship at Manhattan College.

He also hung around the Uptown Billiard Emporium and became a wizard with the cue in straight pocket billiards. "I could rack 25 and 35 balls," he said. "Sure, I think playing pool helped me. It helped me on angles in." At 17, Ford won the New York State Junior Championship and from then on golf was in his blood. He was a leading amateur when he turned professional at the National Open at Medinah in Chicago in 1949.

"I won my first check at Phoenix—it was \$250," he said. "I think that's the happiest I've ever been."

Ford, who served three years in the Coast Guard, has been one of the most active players on the tour. In 1955 he played more tournament rounds than any other golfer—a total of 121, a PGA record.

He is married and has three children, Doug Jr., 12; Michael, 6, and Pamela, 2.

Globetrotters Fall To College Stars

ST. LOUIS—A free throw after the final gun by Hank Nowak of Canisius lifted the College All-Stars past the Harlem Globetrotters 52-51 Sunday for their second victory in eight games of a 19-game nationwide exhibition basketball tour.

The spirited Nowak led the collegians down the stretch and finished as the top scorer for the All-Stars with 15 points. Willie Gardner topped the Globetrotters with 15. The last quarter was close all the way.

Lennie Rosenbluth, North Carolina All-American, hit one field goal, then left at halftime to return to school.

Notre Dame's John Smyth was the top rebounder and scorer for the All-Stars in the first half.

A crowd of 7,812 saw the game, played this afternoon prior to the St. Louis-Boston National Basketball Assn. playoff tonight.

The All-Stars led most of the way, having a 13-9 first quarter

lead and 25-21 at halftime. The Globetrotters muffed 10 of 17 free throws in the first half. The Trotters trailed by seven early in the third quarter, rallied for a 37-37 tie, but the Collegians went into the last period with a 42-39 lead.

Boston Gains Tie In Playoff Series

ST. LOUIS—The Boston Celtics, led by Bob Cousy's 31 points, withstood a tremendous St. Louis rally which wiped out all but one point of an 18-point lead and pulled out a 123-118 victory Sunday night, deadlocking their National Basketball Assn. title playoff at two games each before a sellout crowd of 10,035.
