

Sociology Conference Held Here This Week

Leading sociology, anthropology, psychology and research authorities of the Pacific Sociological Society from colleges in seven western states, will hold their annual conference Friday and Saturday in Eugene, according to John C. Scott, chairman of the arrangements committee and associate professor of sociology.

Today and Thursday, in conjunction with the P.S.S. conference, the West Coast Conference for Small Group Research, composed of members of the P.S.S. as well as research officials from leading organizations and associations in the United States, will conduct a series of discussions stressing ideas-in-the-making rather than reports of complete research.

Discuss Needs of Groups

The program for the Small Group Research Conference includes panel and group discussions on topics concerning the boundaries, methods, problems, and necessities of small group research.

John M. Foskett, Joel V. Berreman, professor of sociology, and Abraham Luchins, associate professor of psychology, will participate as panel members for the discussions. Foskett, acting head of the sociology department, will serve as master of ceremonies for an banquet to be held this evening.

U.O. Professors, Students Attend

Participating in the various meetings of the P.S.S. conference on Friday and Saturday will be Berreman, Foskett, Ely Chertok, associate professor of sociology, Raymond Hohle, resident fellow in psychology, Walter Martin and Mervyn Caldwell, graduate student in sociology.

Presently, Berreman is a member of the advisory council and Walter T. Martin is vice president of the northern division of the Pacific Sociological Society. During the 1955-56 year, Berreman served as president of the organization.

Foskett is the newly elected vice president of the northern division for 1957-58 and is chairman of the annual P.S.S. banquet which will be held Friday evening.

Meetings for both events will be held in the Eugene Hotel, except for the Friday afternoon series which will be conducted in the Student Union.

The P.S.S. and the University of Oregon sociology department are the hosts for the entire week-end of activities.

Mystie Sale Planned By Junior Honorary
