TEACHING BY TV

US History Lectures On Televised Circuit

Television in the classroom is now being experimented with both on our campus and at Oregon State College.

Wendell Stephenson, professor of history, began his series of lectures relative to United States history, Wednesday in Villard Hall. A second Wendell, this time Wendell Slaugh, professor of chemistry at OSC, also began his lecture series dealing with elementary chemistry.

Trip East Made

In February, Stephenson, Slaugh and four men from other state colleges made a trip East in order to observe television teaching in action. The colleges and universities which they visited were the following: Miami University, Ohio; New York University; Pennsylvania State Uni-

versity, and San Francisco State College.

Various fields taught by TV in these colleges were, sociological psychology, sociology, physiology, freshmen English, economics, history, and accounting.

Glenn Starlin, acting head of the speech department, who is in charge of the TV lecture series, for the Chancellor, stated that, "Next fall we will be set up to broadcast simultaneously to viewing rooms at OSC, Monmouth, and Oregon certain courses which will be tele-courses."

TV Operates on Grant

Starlin also explained that at present the TV series are being operated on a \$2,000 grant from the Advancement of Education Fund, which the state education system has.

"Next fall there will also be a series on education, involving the three campuses, and is yet to be decided," mentioned Starlin.

David Lewis, who has for several years been associated with various aspects of communication, has recently been brought here to act as production director of television teaching on campus.

Stephenson noted that New York University was the only place using make-up. As he stated, they used "heavy coatings of pancake powder—I do not anticipate that we will wear make-up."

TV Teaching Strenuous

Teaching by television requires a greater amount of work on the part of the professor, as Stephenson found in the various educational institutions they visited. The minimum amount of hours spent on a one hour TV lecture ranged from 10-12 hours, while the maximum was 40 hours. He stated that at present he plans on spending between 35-40 hours on his lectures, once they become firmly established, and he has the time to devote to them.

"Television teaching in certain fields could be better than conventional class room teaching," stated Stephenson. He also backed up his statement with two reasons, "first, because the teacher can use so many more visual aids in a studio than he can use in a classroom," and, "secondly, because the professor spends a great deal more time in

Stephenson seemed to sum up both his feelings and the feelings of other people working on the TV series, when he concluded that, "I am convinced effective teaching can be done by television."

Policy Set

A tryout schedule policy has been formed by Vodvil co-chairmen Mike DeVore and Dorothy Gamblin.

1. The living organizations will be required to be ready to give their skit at the assigned time. Any group not ready will be automatically eliminated.

2. Each group will be given fifteen minutes to set up props, give skit, and clear the stage. At the end of each fifteen minute period any group not on stage at the scheduled time will be eliminated.

3. Each group will be responsible for its own props and sets, setting them up and taking them off the stage and out of the building.

4. Each skit is to be no more than ten minutes in length. Points will be deducted from the total scores for lengthiness in excess of the prescribed time.

5. Each group must bring two copies of their script to their tryout appointment.

Activities for the petition should be listed under four categories: chairmanships and sub-chairmanships, group and staff activities (living group and publications), organization and committee membership and miscellaneous.

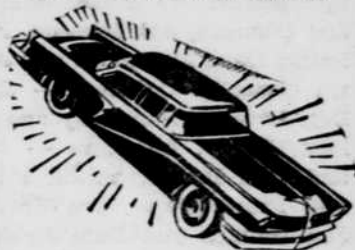
Kwama members may be consulted concerning the petitions. Thirty women will be tapped Junior Weekend.
