Rates for the magazine are sponsor, \$15 and two years; donor, \$5 and two years; 2 years, \$2.25, and one year, \$1.50.

Content of the new magazine will be regional short stories, essays, poems and articles of a specific interest to the Northwest. The first issue is scheduled to be published in mid-May, and subsequent issues will come out once a term.

The publication is the only one of its type sponsored by a University in the Pacific Northwest. Writing for the magazine will be done by students, professors and professional writers.

many families, both the husband and wife work.

"I work or we don't eat," says one working wife.

In more than a hundred University student families, both the husband and wife attend classes. This puts an added financial strain on the family budget, so often they both work to earn money. In the other 950 campus marriages, only one partner goes to school.

The stereotype of the college marriage has the wife putting her husband through college—she holds a full-time job while he attends classes. The University doesn't offer a Ph.T. (pushing hubby through) degree like many schools do, but if it did, almost 850 student wives could qualify. On the other hand, about 100 wives attend school while their husbands bring home the family paycheck.

Job Types Varied

Although some students find jobs on the campus, most of them seek jobs elsewhere, for the student pay scale is low at the University.

The students work at many types of jobs. Men work in service stations, drive school busses, sell in department stores and work as skilled help. Some of them can earn money as they learn the work in their professional fields. Service training helps others to obtain jobs in the skilled trades. Many of them work for local businesses and industries. On campus they may find part-time work in the various schools and departments.

Many women who are helping to balance the family budget find jobs as secretaries, receptionists or salesladies in business organizations. A few women teach school. Typical campus jobholders are departmental secretaries or library assistants.

The money these students receive varies as much as the jobs they hold. Many campus jobs pay less than a dollar an hour. Skilled help can earn high wages.

Money Comes in Several Ways

Practically all of the students work during the summer, both for current expenses and to pile up a backlog for the coming year. Here, too, jobs vary greatly.

The students obtain money for their schooling in other ways. Veterans with one dependent are entitled to an allotment of \$135 each month under the G.I. Bill. Vets with two or more dependents receive \$160. Some students receive help from their parents. A few hold paying jobs in top campus activities. Scholarships aid some students, but many rely on student loans to see them through school. Upperclass men enrolled in the ROTC program get an allowance of 90 cents a day.

Current expenses consume most of the students' money, and the majority of them live on a month-to-month basis. They can save little money, and unexpected expenses are a problem.
