needed by the student couple. Often household furniture and appliances can be purchased from students who are moving out.

Families Decorate

Families are allowed to decorate the apartments in any way they like. The only University restriction regarding upkeep is that the physical structure is not to be changed. However, other than that, decorations may run wild.

The University issues two gallons of white paint annually to each student family with a two-bedroom apartment. The couple adds color pigment to suit its own taste.

One couple decorated their ceiling in a black and white checker-board pattern. Another couple painted a brightly-colored modernistic mural on one wall of their home.

Bright shelf paper, fresh curtains and newly slip-covered armchairs add a homelike touch.

Villa Houses 40 Families

Skinner's Butte Villa has facilities for forty student families. This University-owned housing project is located several miles from the campus, north of the University. One and two bedroom apartments here rent for \$48.00 and \$52.00 regularly. This rental includes all utilities, including steam heat.

In addition to other furniture, these apartments have an electric refrigerator and an electric hot plate. The units are assigned on the basis of number of children in a family, with the largest families receiving preference. Veterans have preference over non-veterans, and other units are assigned on a basis of date of application.

Smaller Projects House Families

The Columbia housing project, located in the 17th and Columbia streets area, is made up of one-bedroom apartments. These homes rent for \$45.00 a month, including water, garbage service and electricity. Twenty-four student families live in this project.

The other two University-operated housing projects, the Agate Street and Emerald Street housing, are operated on a faculty preference basis. When no faculty members or graduate assistants are on the waiting list, these units are also assigned to students.

Like the other projects, these are furnished. Student rental for these one-bedroom, pre-fabricated houses is \$40.00 a month, including water and garbage service. These units are heated by electric wall heaters which are supplied by the University.

Laundry houses are centrally located in all the University-owned projects. These are equipped with conventional machines, automatic washers and steam dryers.

Applications on File

Married student housing is obtained by writing into the University housing department. The student's application is placed on file, and when he is in line for an apartment, he is notified. The housing office now has applications on file up through 1960. All students, to be eligible for the housing, must carry at least 12 credit hours.

Students who will be returning to school in the fall are allowed to spend the summer in the apartments if they wish. Or if they plan to return but will be out of town during the summer, they may sub-lease.

Plans for future married student housing are only tentative, according to W. N. McLaughlin, assistant University business manager. The University hopes to have more structures available by 1960, but high building and property costs may prevent this.

The University faces the problem of erecting permanent dwellings which can be rented at a reasonably low cost. Most structures which could be built now, McLaughlin said, would need to rent for \$65 to \$70 a month. Most families can't afford this, and the University needs to find a way of building houses which could be rented for \$45 to \$50 while still giving the students an adequate place to live.

Hearing Scheduled On Discrimination

Anyone with "pertinent facts" on formally expressed racial discrimination in campus fraternal organizations has been asked to appear at public hearing Wednesday night at 7 p.m. in the Student Union.

The hearing will be conducted by the ASUO fact-finding committee. All those who wish to introduce information must call committee chairman Charles Koburger, ext. 584, to arrange for scheduling.

Information from individual fraternities and sororities will not be available for the Wednesday hearing, Koburger said, because Inter-Fraternal Council and Panhellenia have not met recently. Koburger still hopes to get a statement from the Office of Student Affairs about the kinds of "support" it has given Greek organizations.

Administrators Name DuShane National Chief

Donald M. DuShane, dean of students, was recently elected president of the National Association of Student Personnel Administrators for 1957-58.

The election was held at the 39th anniversary conference of the organization at North Carolina State College.

Among his newly acquired duties is the one of appointing members to various committees, including public relations, nominations and place, ladies' program, and resolutions.

Another responsibility is that of appointing members of the continuing committees such as the Liaison Committee with NCCPS, Cooperation Committee with UDNSA, and Committee on merit scholarships. There are ten continuing committees in all.

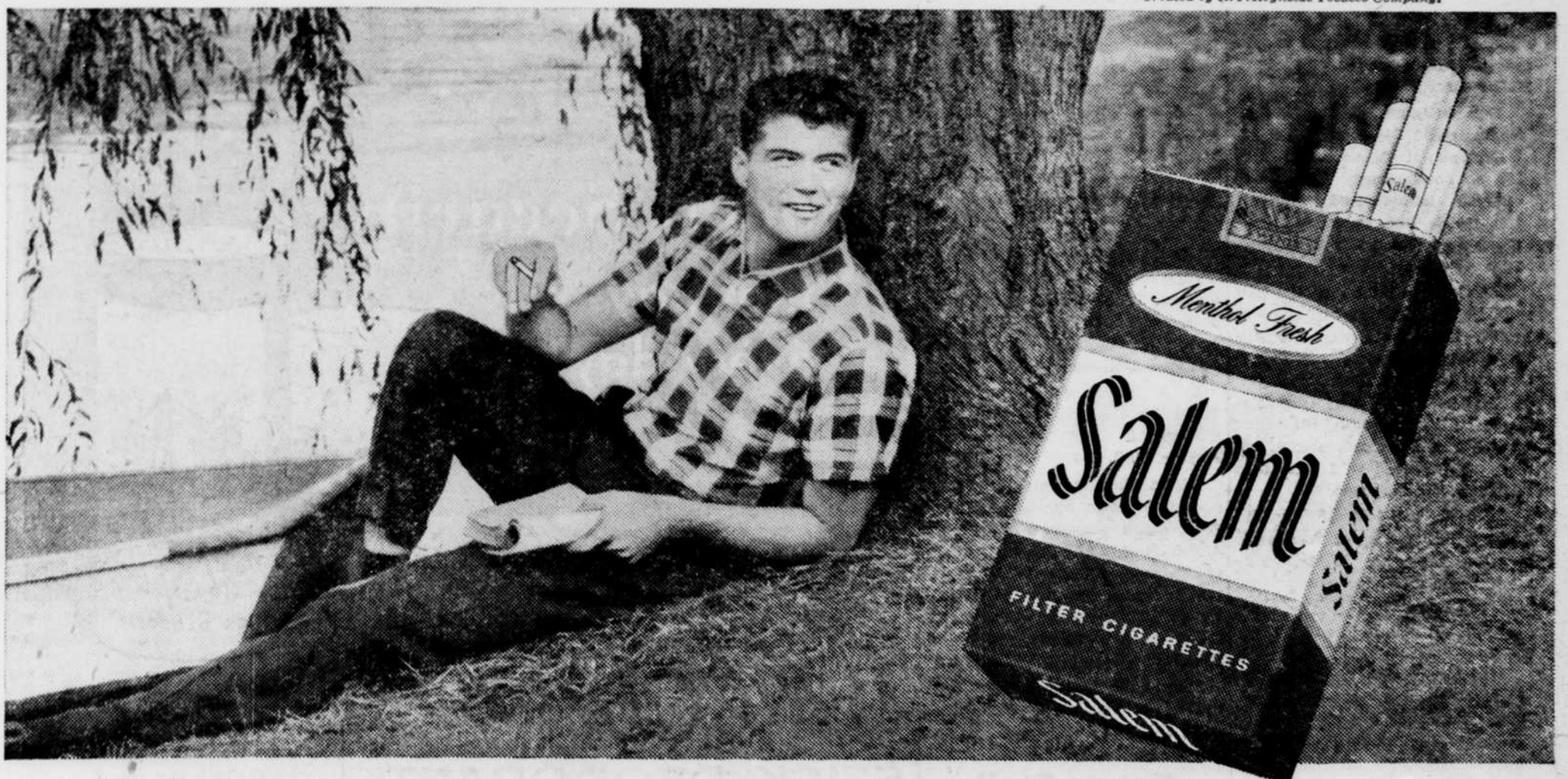
In 1953-54 DuShane served as vice-president of NASPA, working closely with the Statement of Principles. He earlier served on an executive committee for three years.
