Kenton All-Stars To Appear Sunday

The Stan Kenton All-Stars will appear at a 2 p.m. matinee in the Student Union Ballroom Sunday. Tickets will be \$1.00. The concert is sponsored by the SU board.

The All-Stars are Pete Jolly, piano; Jack Montros, tenor sax; Donna Fuller, vocalist; and Sonny Criss, alto sax. Criss has been interested in jazz since high school when he played with such artists as Charlie Parker, Howard McGhee and Gene Norman.

Since his first professional appearance he has been with Howard Rumsey and the Lighthouse All-Stars, Flip Phillips, Buddy Rich, George Shearing and Billy Eckstine. In 1948 he was with the Jazz at the Philharmonic tour and reappeared with them in 1949. He was with the Stan Kenton "Jazz Showcase" in 1955.

This is the first year that Criss has been with the Kenton All-Stars.

PLANS LAUNCHED

Entire Week Devoted To Junior 'Weekend'

Plans are now under way for the 1957 University Junior Week, from May 11 to 18. Unlike former years, the traditional events shall take place within a complete week, instead of just one weekend.

Saturday evening, May 11, will start the festivities with the Junior Prom, "Twilight Time," from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. Closing hours will be 2 a.m. The Student Union calendar which states that the Junior Prom is on the previous Thursday, is a mistake, according to co-chairman Sue Ryder.

While dancing to the music of Les Brown, the ballroom will be set in a "silver-and-black" theme. Dress will be formal; white dinner jackets or dark suits for the men and formals for the women. Corsages are optional. The Queen's Coronation will be held during the evening. Tickets are \$3.00.

Traditional Clean-Up will take place on Thursday, May 16, from 3:55 p.m. to 5:00 p.m., followed by a terrace dance. Each living organization will meet at the SU and be assigned to a certain area. The pairings will appear in the paper that week. Judging will place emphasis upon appearance of area and how hard the students worked.

Styles in Sound

Styles in Sound, the 1957 Canoe Fete, has been scheduled for Friday, May 17 on the millrace. Plans have been made to change the date to May 18, however, in case of rain. In this case the All Campus Sing will be held Friday evening.

All Campus Luncheon will be held on old lower campus, in back of Commonwealth, from 11:15 a.m. to 1:15 p.m. Saturday, May 18, according to Chairman Nora Walsh. The price is 55 cents and a box lunch, consisting of sand-

wiches, potato salad, beverages, and other picnic foods will be served. Tappings will be made following the luncheon. A University of Oregon track meet will be held at Hayward Field afterwards.

The All-Campus Sing is regularly scheduled for Saturday evening at 8:00 in McArthur Court. Seven men's and seven women's living organizations will compete in this final show for first place and best director trophies. Tickets sell for the flat rate of 85 cents per person.

Eliminations for the men will be on May 6; for the women on April 30. The elimination times will be printed in the Emerald.

Traditions for Junior Week will be announced soon, according to Jim Fratzke. They will be enforced beginning Wednesday, May 1, through Junior Week. A different policy will be used with the "tug-of-war" contest. If the freshmen win, they will be able to discard their beanies and ribbons for the rest of the week and the entire year. However, if they lose, the articles will be worn every Wednesday during Spring term.

Tickets to the various events during Junior Week will be on sale one week before the Junior Prom, at the co-op from 9:30 to 12, and from 1:30 to 3 and all day at the Student Union main desk. All Campus Sing are 85 cents, Canoe Fete is \$1.25 adults, \$.75 students, \$.50 for a child, and the luncheon is 55 cents.
