

Ducks Beat Idaho Thinclads

Five Webfoots, One Vandal Set Records in Run-Away

Idaho brought an eleven-man track and field team to Hayward field Saturday but it might just as well left eight of the cinder-men home, as Oregon rolled to its sixteenth straight dual meet victory with a 113-18 win over the Vandals.

Only three Vandals placed in the meet, which in effect was no more than a good time trial.

Idaho's 13 points came on Ron Kramer's victory and new meet record in the shot put with a throw of 50'7"; Ray Hatton's triumph in the two mile and second place to Jim Bailey in the mile; and Dick Boyce's narrow win over Jim Grelle in the 880.

Duck thinclads set five new meet marks on their way to the 95-point decision. Bailey got the record parade underway in the meet's opening event by taking a slim victory from Hatton, the 26-year-old Englishman, in a 4:19.5 mile.

Ed Bingham established his second record in two weeks by throwing the javelin 216'1/2," topping by 12 feet, his own mark set last season.

Sophomore Ken Grant continued to improve in the high jump by sailing over the cross-bar at 6'5", breaking the old mark by one inch.

Two records held by one-time Vandal great Bruce Sweeney went by the boards Saturday as Martin Pedigo stepped out 23'1" in the broad jump to break Sweeney's record by four inches, and old reliable Doug Basham trimmed a tenth of a second off Sweeney's high hurdle mark with a :14.6 clocking.

In addition, veteran Jack Morris broke the 100-yard dash record with a time of :09.5, but the mark was ruled out because of 5.8 mile-an-hour wind. Jack Brown, who finished a half-stride back, was given the same time, and Sam Taylor, who completed the Webfoot century sweep, one of the eleven events in which Idaho was shut out, ran a creditable :09.6. Brown and Taylor returned to run 1-2 in the 220.

Sophomore Jack Burg, vaulted 13'8" for the third straight week, but this time teammate Sam

Whitney failed to clear the mark, to give Burg his first clear-cut first place of the Northern Division season. The past two weeks he has had to share top honors with Whitney.

Gene "Red" Estes, the fast-improving soph from Springfield, nailed down his second first in three weeks with a win in the discus. Red's throw of 150'6" barely edged teammates Bob Amble and Paul Tucharth.

Sophomores Jerry Christian and Glen Small picked up their first victories of the ND year. Christian squeezed by fellow-Ducks Arden Christensen and Jerry Schwartz to win the 440 in :50, and Small walked off with low hurdles honors in :25.1.

Besides the shot put Idaho's only cause to cheer came in the distance events. Boyce's race with Grelle must go down as one of the most exciting in Oregon-Idaho dual meet history.

Grelle and teammates Bill Cromwell and Lee Thornton stayed at leader Boyce's shoulder for 660 yards, where Idaho's other 26-year-old Englishman made his move. The Vandal moved away from Cromwell and Thornton, but couldn't shake Grelle as the two battled down the stretch stride-for-stride. A last minute lunge at the tape by Boyce gave him his razor-thin triumph.

Hatton's win over Robbins was also a thriller, as the two ran side-by-side for seven laps in their two mile duel. Robbins began his sprint at the start of the last lap, but could not lose the faster Hatton and Ray zipped by in the final 100 yards to win in 9:43.4.

Hatton also gave Bailey a big scare in the mile, where he tried the same tactics that he used on Robbins, but the experienced Bailey had too much speed for the Idahoan in the stretch drive.

The day's most humorous event was the mile relay, where two Oregon teams battled it out. Arden Christensen, anchor man for the A team, had a large lead over Bailey, but waited for his teammate behind the stands and the two runners finished the race in a dead heat.

Reed's Dick U'ren topped Marvin Woods, 6-1, 6-1, in the feature match, but the Webfoots came back to win the next four matches.

Larry Ottis, Wayne Henninger, Bob Graham, and Phil Lowthian each won two-set matches for Oregon.

Only Henninger and Lowthian could pick up victories for the Ducks against Seattle. Don Kovacevich defeated Bruce Dingler, 6-2, 6-2 in the feature match.

The Oregon Frosh dropped a close 3-2 decision to Klamath Falls High School despite victories by Phil Northcote and Gary Rink. The Frosh now carry a 1-2 record this season.

Friday Dick Williams' Webfoots dropped a 7-0 decision to the University of Portland on the UO courts. Earlier this season, Portland defeated Oregon 5-2.

Oregon now has two wins and five losses.

Bennie Daniels gave up 11 hits in the first game, and Bob Garber spaced five nicely in the second.

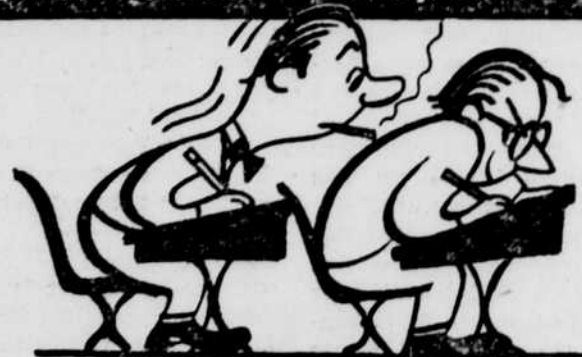
In the first game the Stars jumped into a 1-0 lead in the first inning on Eddie O'Briens bingle with the bases loaded.
