WUS Solicitations Leaders

World University Service house solicitations winners were announced at the Vodvil Show as Alpha Delta Pi, first, with a per capita contribution of 76 cents and Chi Omega second, with a per capita contribution of 53 cents.

The traditional award, "Herman the Moose" was presented to the "Ugly Man" contest winner Tom Howser, Sigma Phi Epsilon, at Friday night's vaudeville show.

Howser collected over \$148 in his victory drive and nearly \$600 were contributed in all. Money from the contest went to the World University Service fund.

Bill Davenport, Delta Tau Delta, finished second with \$120 and Ken Hastings, Delta Upsilon, was third with \$119.

The University Millrace was the scene of the Duck Preview Olympic Games. Winner in the women's war canoe race was Gamma Phi Beta. Sigma Phi Epsilon took the men's contest after several heats to win the trophy.

Canoe jousting, a two-man canoe event, was won by Chi Omega in the women's division and Sigma Alpha Mu in the men's. Novelty races planned for the afternoon were called off due to the lack of time.

The races were sponsored by the Student Union recreation committee.

An orientation assembly with welcoming addresses by University President O. Meredith Wilson, ASUO President Darrel Brittsan, and other campus leaders was held Saturday morning.

Department tours lead by Skull and Dagger and Kwama members followed the assembly.

WUS Auction Held

One of the concluding events of the annual World University Service drive was the WUS Auction Saturday afternoon in the Student Union, which added \$228 to the organization's drive contributions. Highest bid of the event was \$61 for the Dixieland Ducks band by Delta Gamma.

Also auctioned were the rally squad, football team, Betty Co-ed and Joe College finalists, the Sweetheart of Sigma Chi finalists, the Swamp Girl finalists and the Delta Four.

Stan Kenton's All Stars played for the Duck Preview dance Saturday night. Intermission entertainment by vocalist Patty Elsenhart, the Kappa pledge class, pantomimist Dick Engdahl and Gene Nudleman and Dave Diercoff, banjo and piano players.

"I'm pleased with the Preview, and especially pleased that the Administration thought that this year's assembly was an improvement over last year's," commented DyAnne Schneider, co-chairman with Fred Nunn of the Weekend.

"Let's Go U of O" was the theme for the Preview.

The following rules will be in force through the coming election:

1. No sign, poster, or other promotional material shall be tacked, nailed or otherwise secured to trees and shrubs of the campus in such a way as to penetrate the bark of the trees or shrubs.

2. Use of sound equipment, rallies, car parades in and around the campus is limited to the following hours: noon to 1 p.m., 5 p.m. to 7 p.m., and 10 p.m. to 10:30 p.m. Candidates are cautioned to avoid the infirmary, Sacred Heart hospital, and the residential areas.

All candidates for ASUO offices should pick up a copy of the campaign rules after 3 p.m. today, according to Doug Basham, ASUO vice-president.

The rules are available in the ASUO President's office on the third floor of the Student Union.

3. No sign of a political nature may be displayed in, on, or around the Student Union building or grounds.

4. Each candidate is responsible for clearing the campus of his literature after the campaign is concluded. Any candidate failing to do so will be subject to disqualification by the ASUO Vice President.

5. All campaigning must cease before the opening of the polls on election day.

6. No signs, posters, or other promotional material, can be visible on the day of election.

7. No torch parades are allowed.

Sophomore Honors Exams Scheduled

Dates of spring-term comprehensive examinations for Sophomore Honors have been announced by Hoyt Trowbridge, chairman of the Sophomore Honors Committee.

The schedule is as follows:

May 16, Biological Science and Physical Science;

May 21, Literature;

May 23, Study of Society;

May 28, History.

All examinations will be held in the evenings from 7 until 10. The rooms in which they will be given may be learned from instructors in Sophomore Honors courses, or from the chairmen of the subcommittees for each field.

The award of Sophomore Honors is given to students who pass four of the comprehensive examinations, in literature, history, study of society, and either biological or physical science. The examinations are open only to students eligible for Sophomore Honors, but they do not need to be currently enrolled in an honors course. Students may prepare for them by independent study, or by taking other courses in the same fields, Trowbridge said.

A list of readings and topics to be covered on the examination in each field may be obtained from the chairman of the subcommittee in charge. The chairmen are: L. R. Sorenson, history; H. E. Dean, study of society; J. C. Sherwood, literature; R. R. Huestis, biology; and K. S. Ghent, physical science. Further information about the program may be obtained from Dr. Trowbridge.

Porter Comments On Education Aid

Rep. Charles O. Porter, Eugene Democrat, said Thursday that he would not favor attaching a so-called "Powell amendment" to any bill giving federal aid to higher education. The Powell-type rider would limit the benefits of such a bill only to institutions which did not support or practice discrimination.

Porter, freshman Congressman from Oregon's fourth district, said he agreed with Sen. Richard Neuberger (D. Ore.) that "perhaps education is one of the ways of getting across the case against discrimination."

He also stressed that "practically, if we want to get any sort of a bill through, we can't put that sort of an amendment on."

Porter's comments came in answer to a question by Edward Fadeley, third year law student, at a Student Union coffee hour.

Econ Head Discusses Taxes in US Economy

"Any tax system that is successful in raising the necessary funds to support the government expenditures will affect the economy," stated C. Ward Macy, head of Department of Economics in the University lecture in the Student Union recently.

Dealing with the topic "Government Finance in Our Dynamic Economy," Macy stated that it was simple logic that funds necessary to continue public benefits must come from income taxes according to the ability to pay and the benefits received.

According to Macy, this year's expenditures will amount to 100 billion dollars, which will be provided for by income, property and consumption taxes. Macy said that it is because of the tremendous size that government economy has come to be a topic for discussion and controversy
