den for a candidate who did not himself belong to a fraternity. But as long as there are idealistic students here, I shall be the last one to discourage their efforts.

Third, in spite of disclaimers from Lynch, the Emerald, and others, I believe that Mainwaring had the correct information last Thursday when he wrote: "Kalberer's four opponents are all members of Greek living organizations. There is a rumor, discounted by all Greek leaders questioned, that Associated Greek Students party might be reorganized for the purpose of selecting their strongest candidate."

"Presumably the other three candidates would be asked to withdraw." No one denies that this is exactly what happened in the Sig Ep basement Thursday night—all except the title, Associated Greek Students. Kalberer's only crime is that he did not join a fraternity and therefore was not subject to the decision made in the Sig Ep basement.

Fourth, as a member of a strong national fraternity I challenge Mr. Ackerman's statement that "we will take immediate steps to have him (Dahlgren) expelled from our national fraternity (Sigma Nu)."

Dahlgren's only crime is that he is actively and honestly supporting a candidate for president of the student body who does not happen to be a member of any fraternity. Mr. Ackerman, no one is going to be expelled! You have frightened a few weak members and pledges back into line behind your "strongest candidate"; you have done and will do nothing else.

Lastly I would like to report on a sidewalk poll of 91 students which I took this morning in the vicinity of Commonwealth Hall and the Co-op be-

tween 8:40 and 10:10 this morning.

Pair Is Awarded Guggenheim Awards

Two Guggenheim fellowships have been awarded to University faculty members for the coming year.

Bradley T. Scheer, acting head of the University biology depart-

ment, will study in France at the University of Paris marine laboratory. His teaching duties will in part be assumed during his absence by Melvin Cohen, assistant professor of physiology.

Scheer's research will deal with comparative endocrinology. His main subject of study is hormone control in crustaceans. This will be his fourth trip to France. During 1953-54 he studied in Italy with a Fulbright scholarship.

Franklin M. Dickey, assistant professor of English, will study abroad for a year beginning in September. He joined the Oregon faculty last year after receiving a Ph.D. from UCLA.

Preceding this, he was an instructor in English at the University of Michigan from 1950 to 1955. A book by Dickey, "Not Wisely But Too Well," is scheduled for publication by the Huntington Library in September. The book deals with the love tragedies of Shakespeare.

Senior Presents Cello Recital

Nelson Tandoc, senior in music, will present a cello recital at 8 tonight in the school of music auditorium.

Tandoc is member of the Eugene-Springfield symphony orchestra. Last Christmas he conducted the music honor societies in a performance of "Amahl and the Night Visitors."

Tandoc will play "Sonata VI" by Vivaldi-Dallapiccola; "Sonatina," by Mozart-Piatigorsky; "Intermezzo" from "Goyescas" by Granados; Symphonie by Satie, arranged by Tandoc; "Interlude," by Piston and "Sonata," by Shostakovich.

Fund Raisers Asked To Millrace 'Hour'

All students working on the Millrace fund-raising drive are invited to attend the "Millrace Cocktail Hour" May 6 in the Student Union at 4 p.m.

The campus fund-raising drive will be held that night.
