Maddox Paces Oregon Hitters

Oregon left fielder Terry Maddox leads the team in batting through the first four Northern Division games with a .412 average.

The 5-10, 182 pounder placed second in the team batting race last year with a .423 average. This year so far he has connected for seven hits in 17 trips to the plate and also leads the team in runs batted in with seven.

Second baseman Wimp Hastings, who also plays guard on the basketball team, is second in the batting race with seven hits in 18 trips and a .389 average.

Averages include games with Washington State College on April 24, 25, but do not include Monday's game with Idaho.

SF Slugger Nabs PCL Batting Lead

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — San Francisco outfielder Marty Keough has taken over the batting lead in the Pacific Coast League with a .377 average. He beat out last week's leader, Stu Locklin of San Diego, by two points.

The averages include last Sunday's games.

Three players are tied for most hits with 24, one more than Keough. They are Seattle's Joe Taylor, San Francisco's Frank Kellert and Vancouver's Jim Marshall. Marshall also heads the runs batted in department with 19.

Dick Stuart of Hollywood tops the league with six home runs, although he hasn't hit for the circuit in two weeks.

Vancouver Chucker Leads PCL in ERA

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Mel Held, 28-year-old Vancouver righthander, leads the Pacific Coast league in pitching with three victories and a stingy 1.00 earned run average.

Held replaced San Francisco's Harry Dorish as ERA leader after Dorish allowed five runs Sunday to drop to 1.54. Held, Dorish and San Francisco's Duane Pillette each have three wins.

Art Ceccarelli of Vancouver heads the league in strikeouts with 17.

Musial, Williams Hold Bat Leads

NEW YORK (AP) — Off to one of his best starts in his 16-year major league career, Stan Musial of the St. Louis Cardinals holds an early but commanding lead in the National League batting race.

The 36-year-old first baseman is more than 100 points in front of his closest competitor, Joe Adcock of Milwaukee. Musial is hitting an even .500 with 18 hits in 36 times at bat. Adcock's average is .394.

Musial, who has won six National League championships, normally starts slowly each spring. In his first 36 times at bat a year ago he had nine hits for a .250 mark. In 1955, Stan had eight hits in as many trips and in 1952, 1953 and 1954 he had 11 safeties, seven fewer than he's compiled this season.

Ted Williams of Boston, four-time American League batting titleholder, is pacing his circuit with a .395 average. The Red Sox slugger's position, however, is far from secure. Gil McDougald of the New York Yankees and Nellie Fox of the Chicago White Sox are close runnersup with .368 marks.

Kansas City outfielder Lou Skizas paces the American League with five homers and Roy Sievers of Washington leads in runs batted in with 15.

Trojans Practice 'Go-Go-Go' Attack

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Racehorse football is going to play an important part in the scheme of things at the University of Southern California this year under its new coach, Don Clark.

Clark's assistant coach, Al Davis, formerly at the Citadel, is a super-salesman for the "Go-go-go" type of attack. A talk he gave to 30 coaches provides an advance scouting report on the 1957 Trojans for Michigan, Pittsburgh, Notre Dame and other teams that will face USC next autumn.

"Going into each contest we'll have a game plan and racehorse football will be a part of it," said Davis. "We'll operate from the basic T with a balanced line, but we might sprint into an unbalanced line. We'll vary the count on the play, might have automatics. There will be optionals, called at the line of scrimmage, some not. We will throw the optional pass."

"We're in a hurry. Why? We believe racehorse football reduces gang tackling and pursuit — which enables defenses to win football games."

Javelin Jag — a Joke?

NEW YORK (AP) — Track and field coaches, like baseball men, have come up with a "spitter" problem and they're looking for someone like Warren Giles to make a ruling in a hurry.

This "spitter" is the revolutionary style of javelin throwing demonstrated at the Penn Relays last weekend by Miguel Salcedo of the University of Puerto Rico.

Like baseball's illegal spitball, Salcedo's sidarm style depends on moisture for its effect, and the course of the pitch is quite uncertain.

It is an outgrowth of the "Spanish" style pioneered by Felix Erauzquin, who could heave the spear 300 feet but didn't know where it was going. That was ruled out before the 1956 Olympics as being too dangerous.

Salcedo doesn't spin complete-

ly around like Erauzquin, but he does pivot before letting the javelin go and he moistens the shaft so it will slide through his hand. One of his demonstration tosses at Philadelphia veered over into the pole vault pit and sent the vaulters scurrying to safety.

Salcedo apparently has established that any javelin thrower can get a lot more distance — perhaps as much as 100 feet — by using this style instead of the orthodox run-up and overhand throw. The question is whether it's legal and the coaches — particularly Manhattan's George Eastment — would like an answer before next Saturday's Metropolitan Intercollegiate.

Eastment, who has three javelin throwers in the 200-220 foot range and hopes to sweep Met Intercollegiate honors, doesn't know whether to tell them to continue their experiments with the Salcedo throw or stick with

the orthodox.

The rule adopted to outlaw the dangerous Spanish style, in which the thrower whirls like a discus thrower, specifies the thrower must keep his hand on the grip near the middle of the shaft and must not turn his back to the target area.

Salcedo grasps the javelin with his palm down, instead of up, takes five slow steps up to the line, pivots in about a half turn and releases the spear about hip high with a sidarm motion. There's a question whether he turns his back and he admits the wet grip slips from his hand as he completes the delivery.

The Puerto Rican, an unknown in international competition, made an easy toss of 265 feet at the Penn Relays and he recently threw 284 feet, 7½ inches — more than three feet beyond Egil Danielsen's world and Olympic record of 281-2.
