

Kalberer, Lynch Quizzed

 president, Kalberer said that plans for developing the millrace were already set forth, and as far as he knew, present plans were fine.

Lynch did not comment upon the issue. During the past year he has been head of the ASUO Committee which has worked on raising funds, negotiating with the city, and planning future development of the Millrace area.

Amendment Election

Kalberer was asked if he thought that the amendment would have been beneficial to the student body as a whole. He said that the preferential system had been set up to insure minority representation and that not enough students understand the system. He gave no definite yes or no answer to the question.

Asked if he had voted for or against the amendment in the recent election, Kalberer said that his student body card had been solicited for the election, and that he had told the voter to vote for the amendment. He did not vote personally.

The amendment, passed by the student body in a recent election, was successfully contested by law school students. It would have revised the campus election system by separating the ballots for ASUO president and representative and also for class president and representative.

Lynch had publicly advocated passage of the amendment before the election.

ASUO Cabinet

Kalberer said that he understood that the Cabinet formulated the Senate agenda and investigated aspects of student body life. He said that if elected president he would use the Cabinet to continue to delve into student problems, especially those of the married students, and talk to people to find out their feelings on campus issues.

Lynch said that the Cabinet was not a policy-making body but that it was to help the president.

If polls were desirable, they should be used, he said. The Cabinet is not presently functioning up to its capabilities, he said, and it should be "shaped up or shipped out."

Special Groups

The problems of special groups, such as the special students, married students, international students and off-campus students should be investigated, Kalberer said.

He said that he wanted to relieve apathy among married students, and he favored going to speak to them and having them select leaders from among themselves.

The establishment of the post of foreign student senate representative is a big step forward, Lynch said. He said that foreign students living in the campus living organizations would also help to promote understanding of their problems.

Married students could be included into University events more by using Student Union facilities, Lynch added. He said he did not favor a special senate representative for them. Each group can elect a representative to the Senate with the necessary backing, he said.

University-City Relations

The question of improving relations between the city of Eugene and the University was presented, and suggestions for doing so were asked of the candidates.

Kalberer stated that as far as he knew, present relations were satisfactory, but that "anything could be improved."

Lack of knowledge of the city about what the University is doing is the main drawback to good relations, Lynch said. He suggested that the student body president go before civic organizations and tell them of the University's decisions, plans and hopes.

States Athletic Plans

Lynch, when questioned, stated his plan for closer cooperation

with the athletic department. He said that a program had previously been set up where students would "rush" prospective candidates for University athletic teams in an attempt to persuade them to come to Oregon. Pacific Coast Conference rules would need to be clarified first, thought, he told the group.

Students should not have the power to hire and fire coaches, as in some schools, he said, because they are only at the University for a comparatively short period of time. However, if students are dissatisfied with the policies of the athletic department, they should not hesitate to speak out.

Support Questioned

Lynch was also questioned on the support he has gained from three other presidential candidates who have endorsed him in the presidential race. He was asked if he still felt that he was running independently.

"I am obligated to no one," Lynch answered. "I am still running on my own ability. We all (referring to Dick Allen, Harry Hanna and Rob Roy, all of whom have withdrawn from the presidential race in Lynch's favor) came into the race on a fair chance." He said they all expected the president to be elected by the majority of voting students.

"With the voiding of the amendment, a tight party group who could guarantee a block of votes could elect a president. In this way a minority could elect the ASUO President."

He said that the four candidates (Allen, Hanna, Lynch and Roy) had held an open poll of living organizations to select the strongest candidate to insure an election of president by a majority of students.

OSP Manager Talks

Wynn Dahlgren, campaign manager of the OSP, told the group that he had full confidence the election would be decided on the issues. He said that all statements of the party since Friday had been approved by all members of the party.

Dahlgren also called on Lynch to repudiate the "personal attacks on him and on other members of the party" which had occurred "in the campaign and in the editorial in the Emerald." He referred to Monday's editorial in which his name was mentioned as a supporter of Kalberer.

Lynch stated that he considered the matter an internal one one which he need not comment, especially considering the type of campaign conducted by the OSP group.

Kalberer and Lynch will vie in ASUO elections Wednesday. Six voting booths will be open on campus from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m., according to Doug Basham, ASUO vice-president.

Red Cross Officer Interviews Thursday

The American National Red Cross will be represented by Nancy M. Jones, recruitment

officer, on campus Thursday to interview graduating students interested in various positions in the fields of welfare and recreation.

Careers in the Red Cross are open to both men and women who have the following general requirements: U.S. citizenship, good health and world-wide mobility. College graduates are given first preference.

Clubmobile workers, case aides and hospital recreation workers, all with starting salaries of \$260 monthly, and assistant field directors, with a starting salary of \$360, are needed in the women's field.

Men are needed to hold the position of assistant field director at military installations. This job offers a beginning salary of \$350, according to the Red Cross.

Retirement, social security, group insurance and annual and sick leave are among the benefits held by Red Cross employees, and an educational incentive plan offers opportunities for further professional training to those who qualify.

All interested students are asked by Miss Sylvester to contact the graduate placement office in Emerald Hall for interviews.
