

Track Team Swamps OSC

Webfoots Get 13 Wins To Annex Dual Title

Oregon's mighty Ducks closed out their fourth straight undefeated dual track meet season Saturday in Corvallis with a thumping 99½-31½ victory over traditional rival Oregon State.

The Webfoots rolled to 13 out of a possible 15 first places in the most lopsided triumph in Duck-Beaver track history.

Bill Bowerman's Ducks, flexing their muscles one week before the big Northern Division meet, set four records on their way to victory and saw an outstanding "double" turned in by distance ace Jim Bailey.

Bailey clipped off his fastest mile of the season, a 4:13.3 effort, in the meet's opening event, and then an hour later turned in a 1:54.5 880.

Oregon's speedy Aussie, competing exactly one year after his dramatic sub-four minute mile, eked out the narrowest of possible wins in the mile, as he was closely pressed by teammate Jim Grelle. Grelle actually led Bailey for a while on the last lap, but in the final stretch Bailey pulled even and pushed his chest slightly ahead at the wire. Both runners were given the same time, which broke the old standard held jointly by Bailey and Bill Dellinger.

Bailey's win in the 880 was also not an easy one, as Duck junior Bill Cromwell was right at his shoulder all the way down the back stretch. The winning time was only three-tenths of a second off the dual meet record.

"Red" Estes was a surprise record breaker for Oregon as he shocked OSC publicized discus throwers Tom Blackstone and Ron Smart with a heave of 157'5" for victory and a new dual meet record.

The other dual meet mark set by an Oregon competitor was established by reliable Doug Basham. Basham, who had his wisdom teeth pulled on the Monday before the meet, was afraid he would be weak and was quite pessimistic about a record. But he skimmed over the high hurdles in 14.6 to snap the old mark by one-tenth of a second.

Fast-improving Jack Brown, who won both sprints, set a new Bell Field record in the 220 as he upset fellow-Duck Jack Morris in the fine time of 21.7, which ties Brown with Oregon sophomore Steve Anderson for the best time in the division. The versatile Anderson competed in the javelin only Saturday because of a pulled muscle.

Oregon State's Duane Marshall set the day's only other record by southpawing the shotput out 50'8" to edge out the Duck's Jack Moad.

Senator Sam Whitney and Jack Burg, both of Oregon, switched their positions of last week as Whitney cleared 13'9" for first place and Burg followed in second.

One of the day's closest events was the 440 where the Webfoots' trio of Jerry Christian, Bernie Ingley and Arden Christensen and OSC's Vic Hall were all timed in 49.6. The win was awarded to Christian with Hall judged second and Ingley third.

Oregon swept only two events—the broad jump and low hurdles. Unbeaten Martin Pedigo, Denny George and Sam Taylor went 1-2-3 in the broad jump, and Jack Morris, Ingley and Don Steen filled out the sweep in the low hurdles.

Oregon Netmen Drop Two Sets To 'Cats, Aggies

Oregon's varsity tennis squad dropped its sixth and seventh matches of the season here Friday and Saturday against Willamette University and Oregon State College.

The Ducks won both doubles matches in Friday's Willamette battle, but dropped four of the five singles clashes to lose 4-3.

Bob Gorman was Oregon's lone individual winner with a 6-2, 6-3 triumph over the Beavers' Don Smith.

In the doubles Gorman teamed with Phil Lowthian to defeat Bud Mull and Tim Campbell, 6-4, 4-6, 6-3. Lowthian and Marvin Woods tripped Smith and Jerry Winner, 6-0, 7-5.

Oregon State won its second 1957 match from Dick Williams' Oregon netters Saturday, 7-0. OSC won the first match 4-3 at Corvallis.

The matches were much closer than the score indicates with two of them going three sets. Beaver second man Larry Neuman edged Oregon's Larry Otis, 3-6, 6-1, 6-3, and OSC's number three man Dennis Todd tripped Wayne Henninger, 6-3, 3-6, 9-7.

Oregon State's freshman tennis team also won here Saturday as they defeated Oregon's Ducklings 6-1 for their 25th consecutive dual meet victory. The Ducklings lost an earlier 7-0 match to these same Rooks.

The Rooks captured both doubles and all but one of the singles matches. Gary Rink, Oregon's second man upset Jon Minifie, 7-5, 6-3 to kill OSC's chance for a shutout.

Oregon's next matches will be against Idaho at Moscow on Friday and Washington State at Pullman on Saturday.

Frosh Bounce Rooks At Corvallis Saturday

Oregon's Frosh tracksters scored their second straight dual meet win by beating the Oregon State Rooks 81-44 last Saturday afternoon in Corvallis.

Dave Edstrom was the top point scorer for the Frosh by picking up 19 points in winning the high hurdles, pole vault and broad jump and gaining a tie in the high jump.

Jim Norval was the only other double winner for the Frosh when he won the 100 yard dash in 9.9 and the 220 yard dash in 22.5.

D. C. Mills of the Frosh topped all javelin throwers for the day when he tallied a 214' 3" throw which was good enough to beat the varsity's Ed Bingham, who won his class with a toss of 207'7".

Wilcey Winchell won the mile for the Frosh in the time of 4:37.1 with Jim Harmon of the Frosh running second. In the two-mile the only competitor was the Frosh's Vance Parkhurst who was clocked in 10:39.8.

Dan Morris won the low hurdles as he lead the Frosh to a sweep when the Rooks failed to enter anyone in that event. Mike Forrester was second and Bob Dunning was third.

Larry Yakimovitch won the 440 yard dash over the Rook entrants Don Murray and Arliss Dietz in 52.5. Roger King tied teammate Edstrom for first place honors in the high jump at a height of six feet.

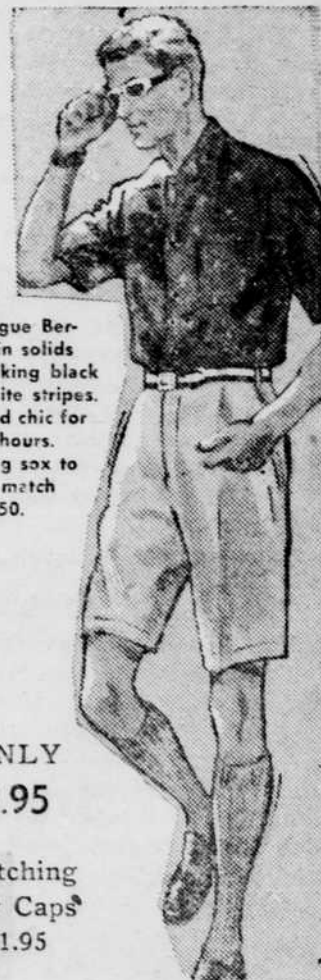
