

Prall Shoots 71 In Oregon Open

University of Oregon golfer Bob Prall was among 11 entrants to break par in the opening round of the Oregon Open golf championships at Waverley Country Club in Portland Monday.

Prall, with a 71, was only three strokes behind leading professional Bill Mawhinney, Vancouver, B.C., and two strokes behind leading amateur Ad Huyke, Portland, and Tacoma pro, Ken Still.

Tied at 70 were three favorites — Bob Duden, two-time champion from Redondo Beach, Calif., Chuck Condon, Tacoma, and Ocky Eliason, also Tacoma. All are professionals.

Ageless Brooklyn Outlasts Braves

The Brooklyn Dodgers climbed back to within one game of the National League leading Milwaukee club tonight, defeating the Braves 5-4 in 14 innings.

A pair of outfielders, Gino Cimoli and Carl Furillo, paced the Dodgers to victory, collecting nine of the club's 13 hits between them and driving in all the runs.

Cimoli cracked five hits, including a 14th inning homer that broke up the game. It was Gino's two-out double two innings earlier that kept the Dodgers alive after Milwaukee had taken a 4-3 lead in the top of the inning. And it was Furillo's single that scored Cimoli with the run that made it 4-4.

Again, it was Cimoli's first hit, a single off Lew Burdette, that started the Dodgers off in the first inning. And it was Furillo's home run, after Sandy Amoros had followed Cimoli with a hit, that gave the Dodgers a quick 3-0 lead.

The Braves pecked away at Don Drysdale and Clem Labine, finally drawing even 3-3 in the eighth on Joe Adcock's sixth home run of the season. Eddie Mathews' pair of homers had given the Braves their first two runs.

Milwaukee's temporary lead, was established in the 12th when Mathews singled for his fourth hit, raced to third on a double by Andy Pafko and scored on Johnny Logan's sacrifice fly.

Ducks Edge Portland, 8-7, Clutch Rally Saves Triumph

For all we know, Oregon may never lose another ball game. Like they've done so many times this spring, Don Kirsch's Webfoots came from way behind Monday at Howe Field to beat Portland's Pilots 8-7 in 10 innings, and about the only one who didn't get to play in the whole affair was Kirsch himself.

The winning run scored on Jim Pifher's short single to left field in front of Wally Panel, while Jerry Urness raced home unmolested from second base. Urness had gained a reprieve earlier when Pilot shortstop Lenny Farrell booted his easy roller.

For the Ducks, who now rest until this Friday when they play WSC at Pullman, it was their seventh straight win and 17 out of 18. The only loss in this stretch was a 8-5 decision to Oregon State.

Everybody took a hand in the scoring Monday, with three home

runs, two by the Pilots and one Duck four-bagger by center-fielder Jerry Urness. Larry Larsen and Warren Williams hit bases empty pitches for Portland home runs.

Even with all this hitting, though, it took three of the toughest Oregon runs in the ninth and almost last inning to knot the score. After Portland had pecked away at starter Lynn

Mohler and reliever Denny Olsen for a 7-4 lead, the Ducks combined two singles, three walks and an opportune passed ball to score those three unexpected runs.

With two out, and Bill Wittila pitching for Portland, Pifher walked, Terry Maddox and Don Lane singled, then Wittila passed Lenny Reed and Jim Pingree, both pinch-hitting. With Ellis Olson batting, catcher Bill McCallen let a Wittila fast ball get through him, and Lane trekked home with the tying run.

The Ducks scored their other four runs in this order: In the first, with Ken Wischman starting for the Pilots, Urness, again, looped a double to right and scored when Pifher tripped to right center. Pifher tallied on George Simpson's line shot to center.

In the third, Larry Hughes forced Pifher at second base, then scored on a wild throw after Lane singled. Add the Urness run, and it's eight runs.

Olsen, in his first assignment in weeks, picked up his second win of the season, allowing only one run during a five inning stint. Joe Etzel, who pitched one inning, took the loss.

SHORT-SHOTS: Coach Kirsch never had a better bench than Monday. In the night, when everything but the weather looked black for the Ducks, he called on Maddox, Read, Pingree, and Olson to show their wares. Only Olson missed, but it was 7-7 when he did, and it didn't hurt so much. . . The Webfoots still sport that pretty Howe field winning technique. Only one defeat there all spring. . . No more action at Howe until May 21,

when the Seattle Chieftains are scheduled. The Ducks close out their home season with OSC, May 23.

Randall had a hand in tying up the game after WSC moved in front 4-3, in the ninth. Mike Pollilo got on with a single, then Randall's hit to the outfield skipped off the fielder's glove, allowing Pollilo to score from first.

The Cougars went down in the top of the tenth without a run. Newt Westergren singled to open the tenth for the Vandals, was moved to second on a sacrifice by Bill Stellmon and trotted in with the winning run as Ralph Lower hit a long ball to center, going as a triple.

Randall put 11 Cougars down via the strikeout route, while Bruce Boldt accounting for three Idaho players striking out.

Oregon State Trims Washington Nine, 7-6

CORVALLIS (AP) — Oregon State shortstop Twink Peterson smashed a two-run homer in the bottom of the 11th inning Monday and defeated Washington 7-6 in a Northern Division Pacific Coast Conference baseball game.

Washington had gone ahead in the top of the 11th on a home run by Monte Geiger.

In the bottom of the 11th, Bob Luby of Oregon State, singled on the first pitch. And then Pederson's homer, also on the first pitch, won the game.

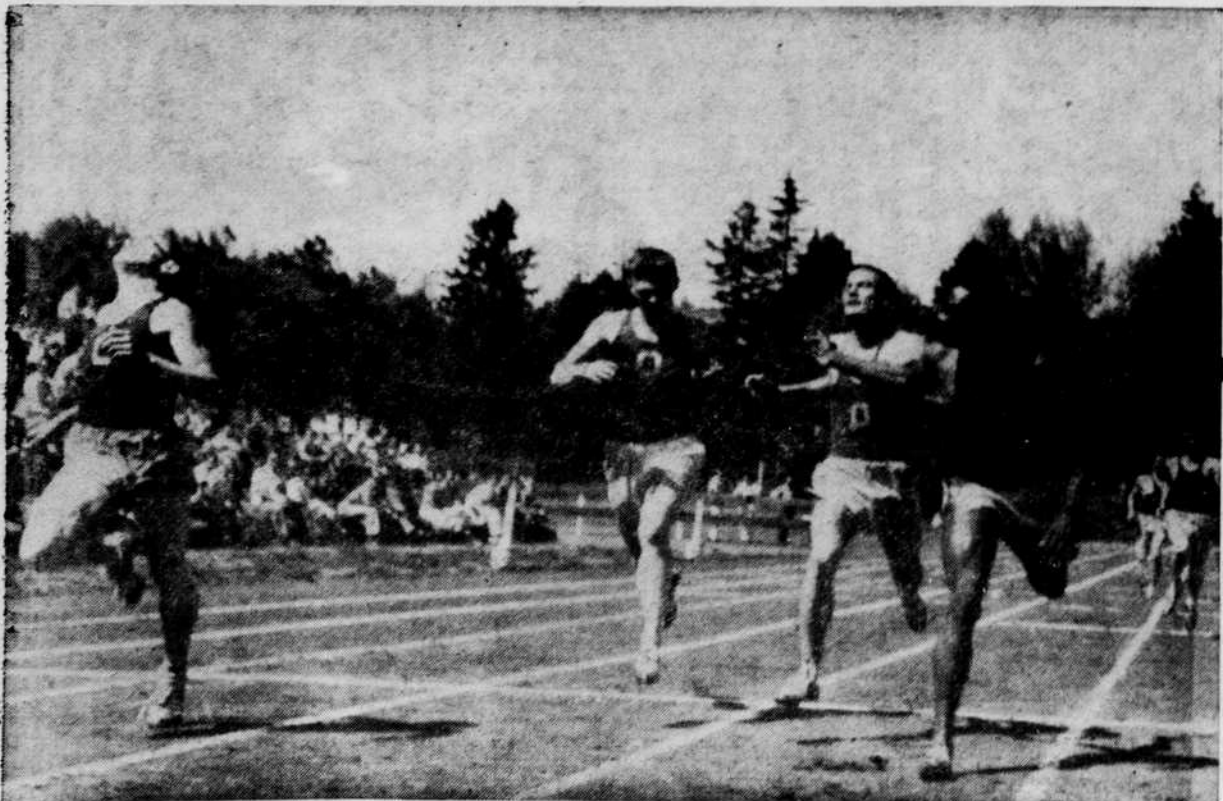
The Staters collected only five hits but got 15 walks off three Washington pitchers. OSC's first two runs resulted from five walks. In the fifth the Staters had five walks and a

single by catcher Dan Lovejoy for three more runs.

Washington scored two in the fifth on a homer by Jerry Thornton. Two more came in the seventh on a triple by pitcher Ed Lajala and a double by Don Dailey. Washington sent the game into extra innings in the ninth when pinch hitter Gieger tripled and came home on Pederson's throwing error.

Fred Paine, who entered the game in the sixth inning, was the winning pitcher and Lajala was the loser.
