Duncan Praises Papers Support

School of Journalism Dean, Charles Duncan, said Tuesday night the "editorial support of the Oregon press was a powerful factor in the effort to raise faculty salaries in the Oregon State System of Higher Education."

Duncan spoke at an American Association of University Professors meeting at Oregon College of Education at Monmouth.

"They were strong and unequivocal. The editors were quick to see the point. Higher education in Oregon was in dire peril and they minced no words about it," Duncan told the professors.

He added that without question, editorial pages had performed a significant public service.

He praised legislators for acting intelligently and constructively in non-partisan cooperation on the question of higher education salaries.

Oratorical Contest Open to June Grads

Seniors who will be graduating in June are eligible to enter the Failing-Beekman Oratorical contest. The contest will consist of 12-to-15 minute oration on any subject.

A manuscript of the oration must be submitted by May 20, to W. W. Nobles, 214 Villard Hall. Final selections of the manuscripts will be made on June 7.
