the chairman to prepare a detailed statement of facts as to meeting space, counseling, advisory, and maintenance employees, social and other privileges, and other services and facilities which are available to groups accorded recognition by this committee which are not identically available to groups not so recognized or to individuals, together with a statement of the extent these facilities and services are beneficial to non-university persons associated with these groups; and resolved that this statement be submitted to competent legal authority to determine the extent, if any, recognition of group foramlly practicing racial or religious discrimination constitutes, under those facts, a violation of federal or state laws or constitutions."

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To Seek Legal Advice

DuShane proposed to seek impartial legal advice concerning the issue.

In a statement to The Emerald, Fadeley said in whole, "I would emphasize as I did at the Student Affairs meeting, that this motion goes no further than to seek legal advice based upon facts. There are no doubt several reasons why no one seconded my motion. It is, however, difficult to escape asking the question why an expert opinion based upon facts seemed undesirable."

He concluded his statement: "If I am heartened by the chairman's recognition of responsibility in the matter, I would like it clearly understood that he went much further than parliamentary procedure requires in stating he would honor the idea expressed in the motion even though it received no second."

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
