

Students to Hear Symphony Free

University of Oregon students will be admitted free to a concert by the Philadelphia Symphony Orchestra set for Sunday at 2:30 p.m. in McArthur Court.

The concert will close the Junior Week activities. Students will be admitted free on student body cards. Special arrangements have been made so tickets will be sold for visiting parents of students who wish to attend the concert, though normally, no tickets are sold for the individual Civic Music Assn. concerts.

The tickets for visitors are available for \$2 for adults and \$1 for students through high school age at the Student Union, the Osburn Hotel in downtown Eugene, and at the box office at McArthur Court in advance of the concert.

No seats will be reserved, so students may sit with their parents.

This will be the final CMA concert of the season. A special addition will be made to the stage at the court to accommodate the 110-member orchestra.

Generally recognized as one of the outstanding musical organizations in the world today, the Philadelphia Orchestra will be conducted by Eugene Ormandy.

The May 19 program will include the "Academic Festival Overture" by Brahms; "Don Juan," a tone poem by Richard Strauss; "Symphony No. 3 in One Movement" by Roy Harris; and "Symphony No. 4" by Tchaikovsky.

Students are asked to keep in mind the fact that this will be an afternoon concert. CMA concerts are normally evening events.
