A panel discussion on American foreign policy towards Russia will be held tonight at 7:30 in the Student Union. The talk, sponsored by the International Relations Club, is entitled "Containment Reconsidered — Is It Still Valid?"

Guest panelists will be William A. Williams, assistant professor of history, J. Cudd Brown, instructor in political science, Charles Koburger, graduate student in political science, and Gunther Koerner, also a political science graduate student.

According to Birger Brandt, president of IRC, the panel will be patterned after the Harkness plan, inaugurated by Professor Harkness of Yale University.

The panel will be followed by a general discussion and by a "division of the house," Brandt said.
