Something of this sort must be done, or we might as well give up going to class and all major in campusology and higher activities. Then Oregon could indeed be the "Country Club."

IKE APPEALS TO NATION

President Eisenhower has called on Americans to face the harsh and inescapable facts of living in a time when the price of peace is high... but when the price of war is higher. The President made the statement Tuesday night in a radio-TV appeal for support of his foreign aid program. Mr. Eisenhower said large cuts in the bill would be a reckless gamble that could lead to the loss of peace and freedom.

BECK RESIGNATION SEEN

The Secretary-Treasurer of the Teamsters Union says he wouldn't be surprised if Dave Beck is asked to resign soon as Teamsters President. John English made the statement shortly after being named to replace Beck on the AFL-CIO Executive Council. English — who has clashed often with Beck in the past—also vowed that the Teamsters will clean their own house of corrupt influences.

MOLLET AS 'CARETAKER'

Sources in Paris say Premier Guy Mollet will remain in charge of a "caretaker" French Government until a new one is formed. Mollet's government fell Tuesday night on a vote of confidence, and he immediately handed his resignation to President Coty. Observers say they expect the crisis to be a long one.

PINEAU CAUGHT SHORT

The collapse of the Mollet government came so quickly that French Foreign Minister Pineau apparently was caught by surprise in New York. Pineau was in New York to attend a meeting of the U.N. Security Council, holding debate on the Suez Canal crisis. He refused comment on his government's predicament, saying he would return to Paris today.

YOUTHS STONE DROWING MAN

Police in Columbus, Georgia, say two teen-aged youths threw rocks at a drowning man when

he tried to swim ashore. Police said the youths had either pushed 53-year-old Miner Robinson into the river, or else he had jumped in to escape when they attacked him. Police said the youths threw stones at him until he was swept downstream and drowned. The boys have been charged with murder.

TORNADOES WREAK HAVOC

Weather on the rampage—in the form of tornadoes — has added at least 15 more deaths

to its two-day toll in Missouri bringing the figure to 53. One deadly twister slammed into the little town of Fremont, Missouri Tuesday night — killing eight persons, injuring twelve others. Red Cross officials said not one building was left standing in the town of some 250 to 300 persons.
