Student-Sculptor Presents Buddha

A life-size bust sculpture of Buddha was presented to the Museum of Fine Arts by a University Nepalese student, Govind Narayana, "Jya-Poo," on the 2501st birthday of Buddha.

Jya-Poo is an accomplished artist in his own country where he received a bachelors and masters degree from the Nepal Art School, where he later taught.

En route to Nepal this summer, Jya-Poo and other Nepalese will visit with President Eisenhower in Washington, D.C. He has made a relief portrait of Washington, Lincoln, and Eisenhower on a background of the United States flag, which he will present to the President.

He sculptured both the Buddha and the relief portrait while attending the University.

"This Is Art" is the title of the art exhibit sponsored by the SU Creative Arts Committee. The main purpose of the exhibit is to give students with creative ability a chance to receive recognition for their talents.

Students from the art and architecture schools will display their paintings and drawings. Other students will display weaving and ceramics. A "live" display will feature a demonstration of the operation and workings of a genuine potter's wheel and will also feature a student weaving cloth on a hand loom.

Also to be on exhibit are handmade jewelry and handloomed materials. Articles from most of these exhibits will be on sale to the general public.

Library Features Printing Exhibition

The Oregon library circulation department is sponsoring an exhibition of printing processes in the lobby showcases.

Under the supervision of circulation head, E. N. Salmon, materials from the library's rare collections, the school of journalism, and the United Press are featured.

In addition, there are books from the Robert Carr Hall collection which were printed by Giambattista Bodoni, an Italian printer who discovered the kind of type used.

The collection was started by a 1926 University alumnus, Robert F. Lane, in memory of Hall who was an associate professor emeritus of the journalism school and superintendent of the University Press for many years.

There are also displays on how a page is printed and how the four-color process is executed.
