

Staff Adds Musicians

Three musicians have been added to the staff of the music school faculty, announced Dean Theodore Kratt.

Gerald L. Smith will be a visiting associate professor of voice. Named as assistant professor of voice. Named as assistant professor of cello is Jerome Jelinek. Normand Lockwood will be a visiting professor of theory and composition.

Smith comes to the University of Oregon after seven years as assistant professor of voice at Northwestern University. He previously taught at Ohio State University and the Chicago Conservatory of Music, from which he received his master's degree in music in 1954.

Smith, who is a baritone, recently made his debut in New York City and has given concerts throughout the midwest.

Jelinek, a graduate of the University of Michigan where he obtained his master's degree, returned to the United States recently after spending a year in England, studying under a Fulbright grant. The young cellist attended the Royal Academy of

Music in London and performed in both England and Germany.

Lockwood is a noted lecturer, composer, and conductor, who joins the Oregon faculty as a visiting professor of theory and composition.

Since 1954, when Lockwood was head of the department of music at Trinity University, he has spent several years as a guest instructor in universities throughout the United States.

YSL Speaker Schedules Talk

Bogdan Dentich, the field secretary for the Youth Socialist League, will visit the campus Tuesday. Dentich's visit is being sponsored by the YMCA and the political science department.

Dentich will be a guest speaker at a coffee hour to be held in the Dad's Lounge of the Student Union at 4 p.m. "The Failure of Liberals on Civil Liberties" is expected to be the topic of the speech he will deliver.

George Boyet, a graduate student in political science and instrumental in arranging Dentich's campus visit, said Dentich's purpose in coming to the University is to arouse interest in the socialistic movement here in the Pacific Northwest.

Dentich has been connected with the socialistic movement for many years and has helped to organize Young Socialistic Leagues in New York State. According to Boyet, the YSL has no organized movement in Portland, Seattle, or Walla Walla.

The YSL is an anti-communistic organization that has been in existence for three-and-a-half years. The League, which maintains close relations with the Independent Socialist League, and is friendly to the Socialist Party, favors the establishment of a Labor Party in the United States.

Alcorn Strikes at Democrats

BOISE, Idaho (AP)—H. Meade Alcorn, Republican national chairman, is expected to lose a final arrow at the record of Democrats in the last Congress during a visit here Monday, Idaho GOP officials said.

The Hartford, Conn., attorney has been surveying Republican organizations of Washington and Oregon the past week. He will arrive here by plane at 11:35 a.m. Monday for the final stop in a Northwest tour.

Saturday night in a speech at Coos Bay, Oregon, Alcorn criticized Democratic handling of the Hells Canyon Dam issue and the civil rights bill.

"I question both the forthrightness and the sincerity of any self-professed champion of civil rights who would coldly toss aside the

great moral principle involved here for a dam that most Americans think we don't need anyway," he said.

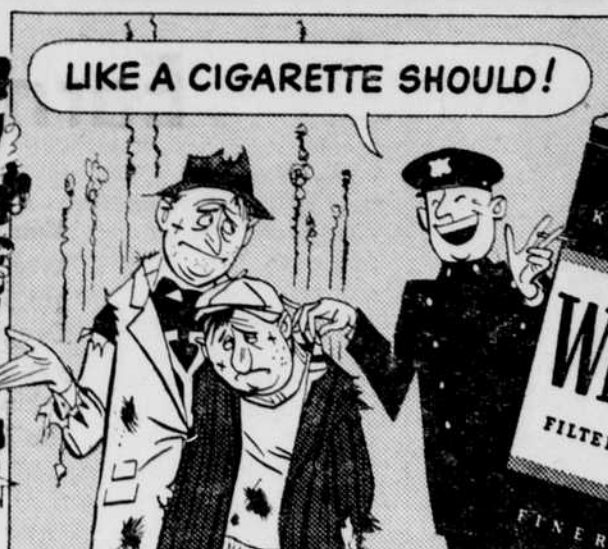
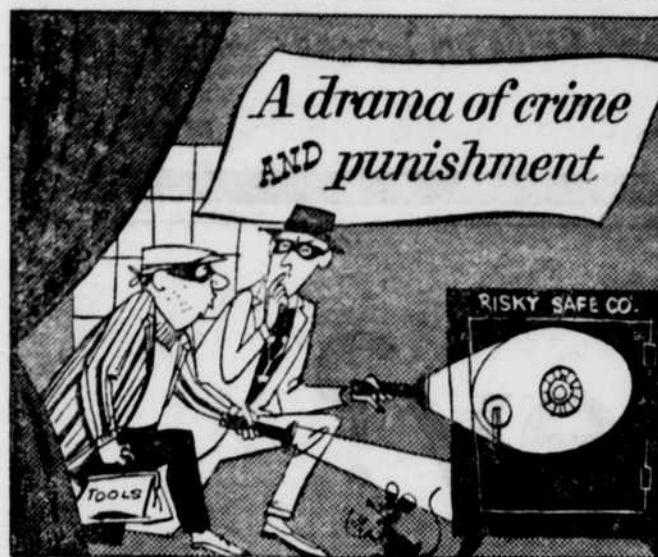
The organization criticized Oregon for what the resolution described as racial discrimination in housing.
