

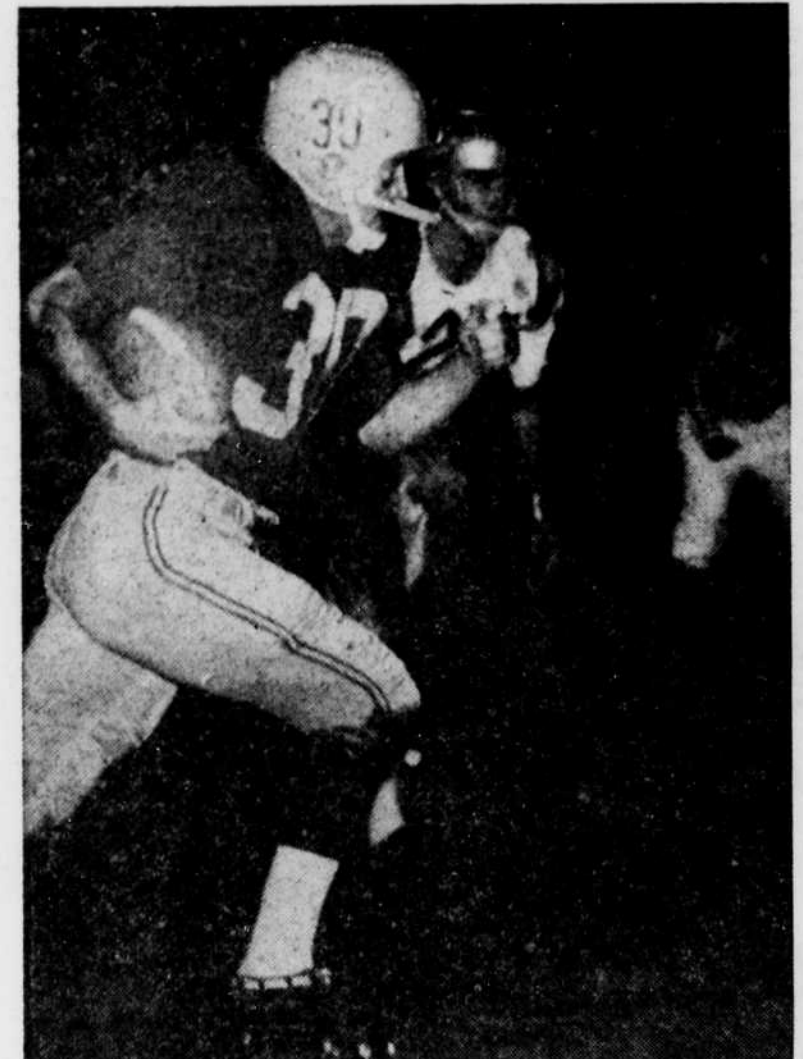
Photos Retell Series, UCLA Story

Braves Collect Edge in Series

MILWAUKEE (AP)—Milwaukee's Lew Burdette, backed by spectacular fielding, beat the New York Yankees' Whitey Ford in a tight pitchers' duel Monday for a 1-0 victory which sent the Braves ahead in the World Series, three games to two.

Burdette, his sliders and sinkers very effective, tamed big Yankee bats by allowing only 7 scattered hits. It was his second Series victory. He won the second game at Yankee Stadium, 4-2.

Back-to-back singles by Ed Mathews, Hank Aaron and Joe Adcock, with two out in the sixth, produced the lone run of the game.

Brilliant support in the field contributed to the triumph, witnessed by a yelling sellout crowd of 45,811 at County Stadium.

Felix Mantilla, who went in for the injured Red Schoendienst in the second inning, and Johnny Logan figured in three Milwaukee double plays which cut down New York scoring threats.

Wes Covington, Milwaukee left fielder whose great running catch was called the key play of Burdette's second game triumph, produced another fielding gem in the third inning.

Gil McDougald, Yankee shortstop, hit a booming drive to deep left field. Covington crashed into the fence in making a spectacular stab of a ball which might have gone for a home run.

Two were out when Mathews, whose home run won the fourth game for Milwaukee Sunday in the tenth inning, beat out a high bouncer to second base. Aaron dropped a Texas-league single in right, sending Mathews to third. Then Adcock laced a single to right, scoring Mathews with the lone run of the day.

Burdette finished with a flourish, fanning the dangerous Hank Bauer and Tony Kubek at the start of the ninth. Then after McDougald had dunked a single over second the Milwaukee ace forced Yogi Berra to pop out to end the game.

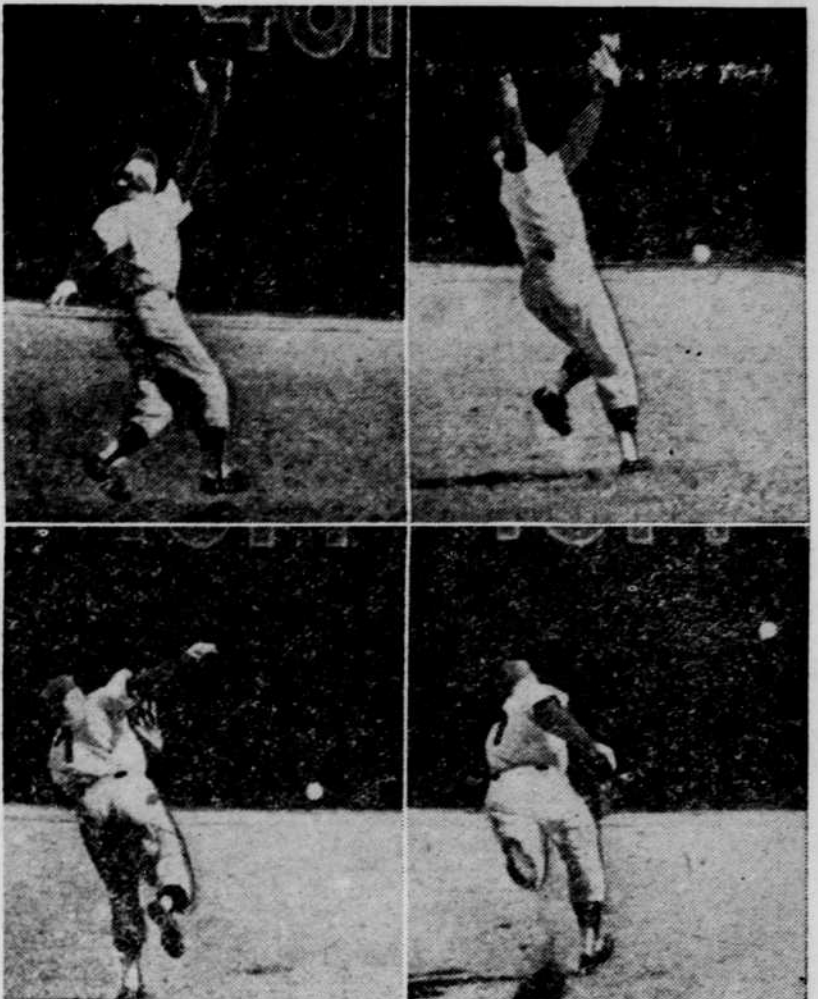
Burdette didn't walk a Yankee and he fanned five.
