

UO Soph Co-ed Reigns Over Pendleton Rodeo

Terry Hill, a blue-eyed sophomore member of Delta Gamma was chosen as Queen of the Pendleton Round-Up this year.

Selected by a board of directors of the Round-Up, Miss Hill was a princess in 1956, along with three other beauties, and was elevated this year to the queen's throne, presiding over the third largest rodeo in the world.

The eighteen-year-old brunette stands 5 feet 7 inches tall, is an English major and plans to go into the business field upon graduation.

Miss Hill and her court traveled the entire summer through Oregon, Washington and Idaho. They appeared on television and rode in the Portland Rose Festival Parade in June. They also attended rodeos in Spokane and Boise, Idaho.

From Sept. 11 to 14, Miss Hill presided over the Pendleton Round-Up. The rodeo, which was televised over CBS television, featured cowboys from all over the United States plus such dignitaries as Gov. Huey Long of Louisiana and Oregon's Gov. Robert Holmes. The Lone Ranger also appeared at the Rodeo.

The Pendleton beauty and her court rode in a parade made up of cowboys, Indians and horses on Friday of the Round-Up.

Queen Terry has ridden since she was 2 years old, and has a horse of her own. However, she was supplied with three different horses by officials of the event during her reign as queen.

She has lived on a ranch outside of Pendleton all of her life, and was chosen to preside over the Round-Up activities because of her poise, beauty and riding ability.

During the time of the Round-Up, the people of Pendleton revert back to the days when the city

was the wildest frontier in the West. Accepted dress for the event is western attire, and during the parade, all transportation is provided by animals or foot.

Susan King, also from Pendleton, a University freshman and pledge of Delta Gamma, was a member of this year's Round-Up Court over which Miss Hill ruled.

'English Easy' Says Italian Fulbright Exchange Student

"I can understand the professors very easily," commented pretty Elena Lunardoni, in her perfect, precise English, after completing her first day of classes in an American university.

But foreign languages are no strangers to this 20-year-old Fulbright exchange student from Rome, Italy, who is attending the University this year as a journalism major. English was easier, she felt, because of a three months stay in England during one summer.

Her major, at the Italian University where she will be a junior next fall, is French literature. "I wish to write for newspaper and magazines," and she explained that Italian newspapers contain a magazine section with every issue. "But they do not teach journalism in Italian schools," she commented.

"In Italy, we do not have physical education classes in the universities," commented Miss Lunardoni, regarding her schedule. U. S. History, U. S. government, Shakespeare, introduction to journalism and history of the Middle Ages would be discouraging to many underclassmen, but Elena has found time to work at the Emerald on the copy desk, and to participate in many activities of her living organization, Alpha Omicron Pi.

She also plans to teach an Italian class at St. Mary's Catholic Church.

Elena really has not had a chance to sightsee in the United States, as she only had a few days in New York before it was time to fly to Oregon. Due to weather, it was necessary to come from Portland on the bus to Eugene where she was met by the AOPi's, complete with a welcoming sign in Italian.

She hopes to have a chance to see a little of the United States on her return trip in June, perhaps by returning to New York by train.

June is three terms away, however, and it's a safe bet that in those terms this talented Italian will make quite a contribution to her adopted school.
