Dilemma Solved By Irish Beauty

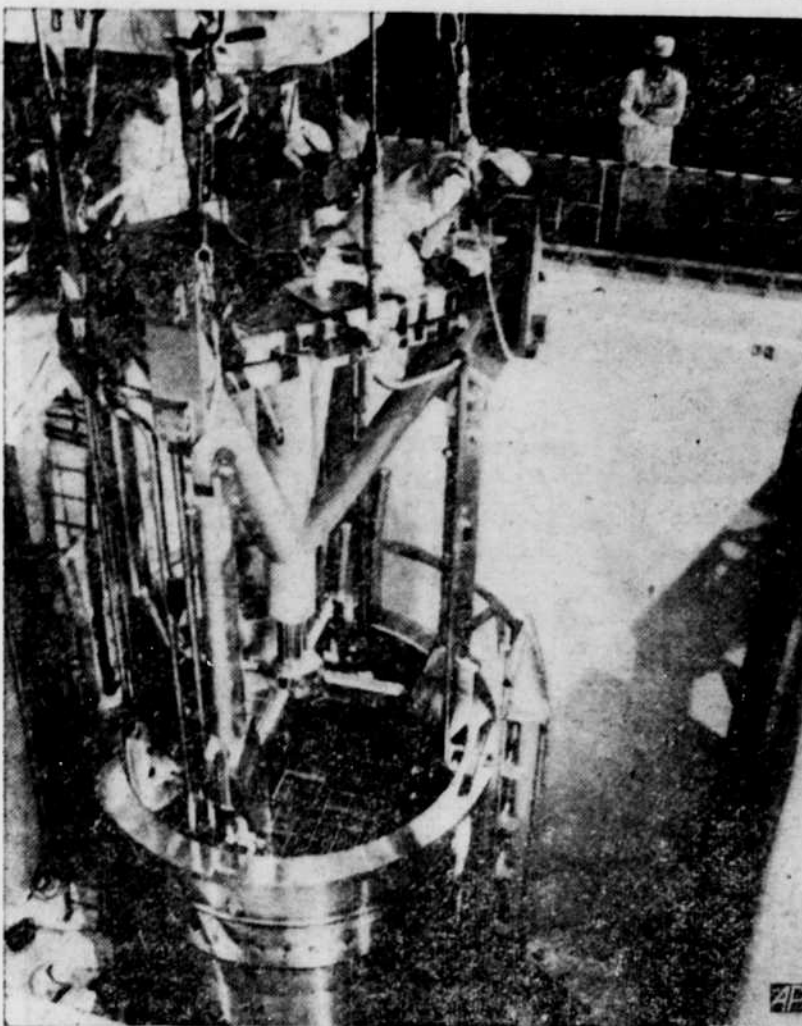
