All Student Union personnel will be attending the first SU Personnel Workshop of the year Saturday from 10 to 12 p.m. in the SU.

A general meeting in the SU Ballroom of the board, directorate, and all skeleton and new committee members will open the morning session. R. D. Horn, professor of English, will be guest speaker at the assembly. Representing the SU on the program will be Betty Bullock, SU personnel committee chairman; AL Ellingson, SU Director; and Jim Smith, SU Board chairman.

The twelve SU standing committees will hold individual meetings immediately following the assembly. The new members will be oriented as to the role of the SU on the campus and their responsibilities during the year.

The entire workshop will be similar to the session held spring term and will be repeated at the end of the school year for evaluation and change in SU program.

Glenn Starlin Goes East to Meetings

Glenn Starlin, head of the speech department, will attend a series of conferences in the east, commencing with the American Council of Education meeting Oct. 20 to 23 at Pennsylvania State college. The conference will discuss educational teaching by television.

The next gathering on Oct. 24-25 will include members of all institutions who have been awarded grants from the fund for the Advancement of Education. The discussion will relate the progress, problems, and future planning of educational television. The Oregon state system of higher education has received \$200,000 from this division of the Ford Foundation.

On Oct. 26 to Nov. 1 the National Association of Educational Broadcasters will convene in St. Louis. From there Dr. Starlin will go to the University of Illinois to attend a board meeting of the Association for Professional Broadcasting Education, Nov. 2-4.
