

# Ducks Lead 'Race to Roses'

when another Webfoot was running.

About Shanley: Sutherland could only describe him. "Shanley won it for Oregon," the subdued WSC mentor said. "He's the coast's greatest running back."

Oregon's first TD drive was engineered with perfection by quarterback Jack Crabtree. Coach Len Casanova's crew, after a tense, motionless opening quarter, were awarded the ball on their own 17 after stalling a Cougar drive.

Shanley, through the middle, and Morris on the outside, alternated rushing, and Crabtree passed complete to halfback Charley Tourville for one 14 yard gain, and sighted rookie end Alden Kimbrough with another pass that ate up an even dozen yards.

Morris, again, carried three straight times for six, six, and three yards, then Crabtree clicked to Tourville on the left side for 15 more yards, and a first down on the Cougar 12.

With one eye on the clock (just a little over a minute remained), Crabtree gave to Morris on a pitch at right end that moved the ball to the WSC six, then the Duck fullback gained five more on the left side. Without hesitation, Crabtree pushed it over on a second down situation, diving atop a crowd of frantic defending Cougars. Morris added his first PAT, and the Ducks had only time to kickoff before the intermission.

The Webfoot's second score began after tackle Jerry Kershner patented a recovery of Don Ellersick's fumble on the WSC 35. It took one play from there.

Phelps, after nabbing the pitch-out from quarterback Sandy Fraser, floated to his right, spied Shanley sandwiched between a pair of WSC napping defenders and lobbed and arching pass to the right halfback.

Shanley caught it easily, tipped to the Cougar 16, then shot by the last WSC lurching opponent, Jack Fanning, for the touchdown, his fourth score of the year. Morris easily kicked what turned out to be the games decider.

### Cougars Bounce Back

Back shot the Cougars, though. Almost as quick as center Dave Fish kicked off for the Ducks, the Staters shook Newman loose. He threw to Ellingson for 17 yards, and the Cougar end made the game's best catch with a twisting, sprawling catch near the north sidelines.

Then Newman threw complete to halfback Laroy Rath for 11 yards, and followed this with a perfect draw-handoff to Stevens up the middle for a 12-yarder. Ellersick ran for seven and Stevens pushed for nine yards, and with the ball on the Duck one-yard line, Stevens punched for the score. Aldrich converted for a 14-7 game.

When the Cougars scored minutes later, it was a play from the Duck bench that saved a 14-14 standoff. Chuck Osborne, at fullback, getting daylight from a huge hole opened by guard Harry Mondale and center Bob Peterson, dove for the upright ball as Newman swung his foot.

"I didn't think I could block the kick," Osborne happily related, "but I could see his foot

aimed toward the left when I jumped."

By that little margin, the ball 'left Newman's foot, hit the post upright at the cross bar and fell free on the field.

Coach Casanova was a humble, happy person in the Oregon dressing room hysterics minutes from the final gun, yet he had group of his performers. "Shanley and Morris were great," he said, "and Mondale, Wheeler, and Welch defended real well."

"We were tired in the last quarter," Cas admitted. "But they defended us almost too good. They've a good defensive ball club."

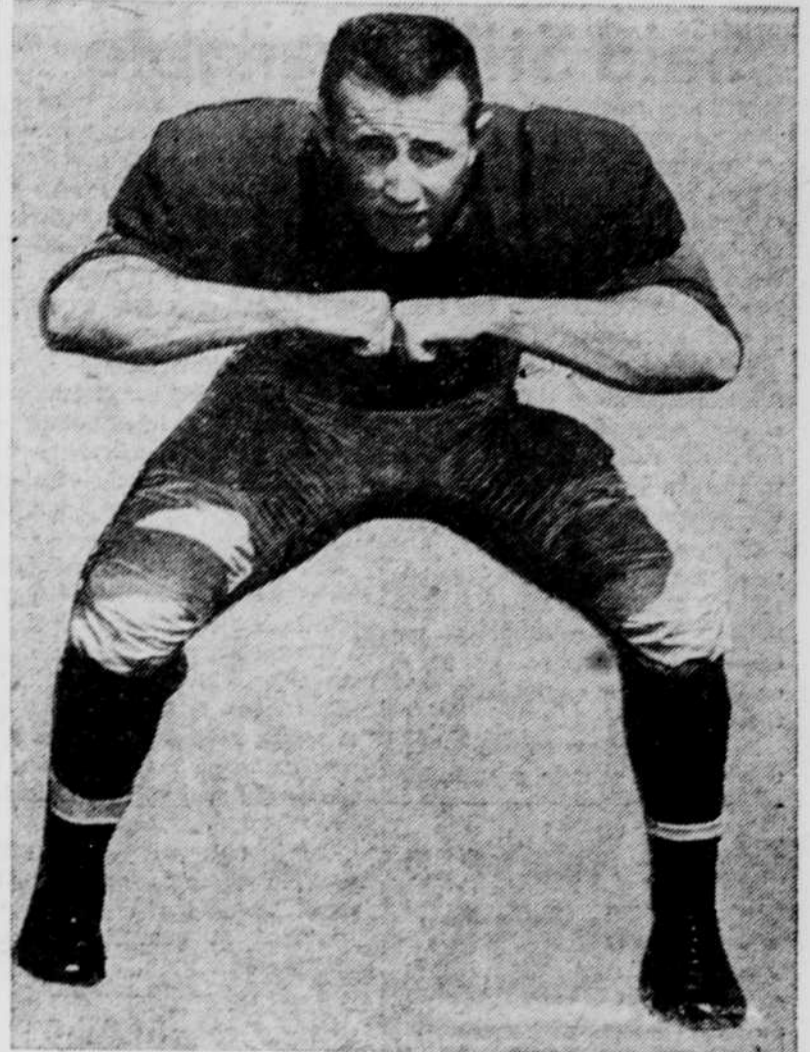
### Sutherland Lauds Ducks

Sutherland, too, thought the Duck's defense meant the ball game. "They should be complimented for their fine spirit," he said, "They don't make many mistakes, do they?"

The great Oregon victory was tainted somewhat early in the opening quarter when starting center Norm Chapman, rushing after an Oregon punt, was nailed by a Cougar blocker, and suffered a possible dislocated ankle. The Medford senior was carried from the field, but x-rays Monday, will reveal the complete injury.

And about the Rose Bowl? "They're all tough from now on," Cas said with a smile. "How can we think about the Rose Bowl?"

Yet the 40-year lid on the coveted Pasadena glory lifted partially for the Ducks. California gets crack number one before Hayward Field fans this Saturday, meeting the newly crowned PCC leaders at 1:30. Then in or-

## Stanford, California, WSC Chase Webfoots for Title

Oregon's 14-13 triumph over Washington State at Pullman Saturday put the Webfoots in the drivers seat in the Pacific Coast Conference race with three wins and no losses, but none of the other Rose Bowl eligible clubs are close to being out of the race yet.

The Cougars have defeated "eligibles," California and Stanford and rate a 2-1 conference record, good enough for second place to Oregon at this point.

The "Bay Area" clubs have each lost only one game and therefore can't be counted out of the race. Both clubs have yet to face the Ducks and could move ahead of the Rose Bowl race with victories over Oregon. The Webfoots meet California at Hayward field next Saturday and Stanford at Palo Alto the following week.

Stanford held its chances together Saturday with a 21-14 victory over Washington's Huskies at Seattle. Fullback Chuck Shea from Beaverton gained 128 yards in 29 carries to lead the Indians' ground forces to 235 yards rushing.

Washington took the lead in the first quarter on a sneak by Huskie quarterback Al Ferguson, but Chuck Taylor's club scored twice in the second period and once in the fourth before the

Huskies finally tallied again with two minutes left in the game.

California won its first game of the season over Southern California's winless Trojans 12-0 in Berkeley's Memorial Stadium. The penalty ridden game saw the Bears score once in the first quarter and add an insurance tally in the third quarter.

Upset of the week in PCC play was UCLA's easy 26-7 victory over previously unbeaten Oregon State College at Los Angeles' Memorial Coliseum.

The inspired Bruins, led by the running and passing of tailback Don Long, scored once in each of the first two periods and twice in the third quarter before allowing the Beavers' lone score in the final minutes of play.

The PCC's only other conference team, Idaho, allowed a COP touchdown in the final period of their game at Stockton, Calif., after scoring the first time they had the ball to tie the Tigers 7-7 in a Saturday night non-conference game.

The Big Ten race to the Rose Bowl was thrown wide open Saturday with two shocking upsets of pre-season favorites.

Purdue scored twice in the third quarter to upset Michigan State's previously number one Spartans went into the game a 21-point favorite but sophomore quarterback Ross Fichtner paced the Boilermakers to three scores in the second and third period for the victory.

Illinois knocked off fourth-ranked Michigan State, 34-13, behind the running of halfback Bob Mitchell and the signal calling of quarterback Tom Haller. The Illini chalked up 270 yards running and 159 yards passing to

gain their second victory of the season.

In other Big Ten competition: Iowa topped Wisconsin 21-7 with some second half power; Ohio State smashed weak Indiana 56-0 while gaining nearly 400 yards rushing; and Michigan scored three times in the fourth quarter to set down a spunky Northwestern eleven.

Other top games in the nation included Oklahoma's 44th straight victory, a 47-0 shellacking of Kansas; Texas A&M's close 7-0 victory over Texas Christian; Duke's 34-7 triumph over Wake Forest; Auburn's 3-0 shutout over stubborn Georgia Tech; and Texas' 17-0 upset win over Arkansas.
