

Oregon Tames Bears, 24-6

Backs Lead Way Over Cal Eleven

last week against USC. They played up to their reputation as a fast-moving, high-spirited outfit, and covered ground awesomely in their one TD drive, but the Ducks were in command the rest of the time.

For instance: Oregon bested Elliot's crew at their own rapid fire game—they ran off the fantastic total of 85 plays in 60 minutes. Total offense yardage: Oregon 343, Cal 202.

Individually, the old dependables continued to shine and some new figures made their presence known. Charley Tourville, Jim Shanley and Jack Morris anchored what is probably the strongest backfield in the West: Tourville ran viciously for 85 yards, the day's high; Shanley

left for the touchdown. A Cal offensive nearly ruined the PAT attempt, but Crabtree snared the ball from its tee, turned right and ran across. Oregon 7, Cal 0.

Center Dave Fish made three straight tackles to help stifle the Bears' next opportunity, but the two teams exchanged possession twice before Oregon was able to change the score again. This time, Gabe Arrillaga advanced only four yards in three plays for the Bears, to their 24. Roger Ramseier, back to punt, hardly had his right foot off the ground before Pete Welch made his sensational breakthrough to block things.

The ball rebounded high, and several men scrambled for it before Bob Heard made the recovery on the seven. Brilliant sunlight signaled a further increase in Oregon's fortunes, as Jack Morris slanted a perfect 14-yard goal over the crossbar, on fourth down. It was Morris' third goal of the season.

Before the half ended, Bruce Brenn made his first appearance at end since injuring his knee last year. Jim Shanley ripped off a 21-yard gallop, and Jack Morris made a sensational interception, though this drive ended just before the gun on Cal's 26.

California initiated second-half activities with frightening determination. Led by massive Joe Kapp, Elliot's outfit rushed 66 yards in 2:48 for their only score—Oregon never really got its defense in order during the drive. Halfback Darrel Roberts hurdled across from the one for the climax, and the PAT was unsuccessful.

Jim Shanley answered for the Ducks by catching the kickoff en route, and sailing 38 yards to the midfield stripe. Tourville added 19 yards worth of runs before action bogged down.

From here, neither team broke past the midfield stripe until the quarter's waning moments, when Chuck Osborne snared a Cal pass on their 35, aided by Darrel Aschbacher.

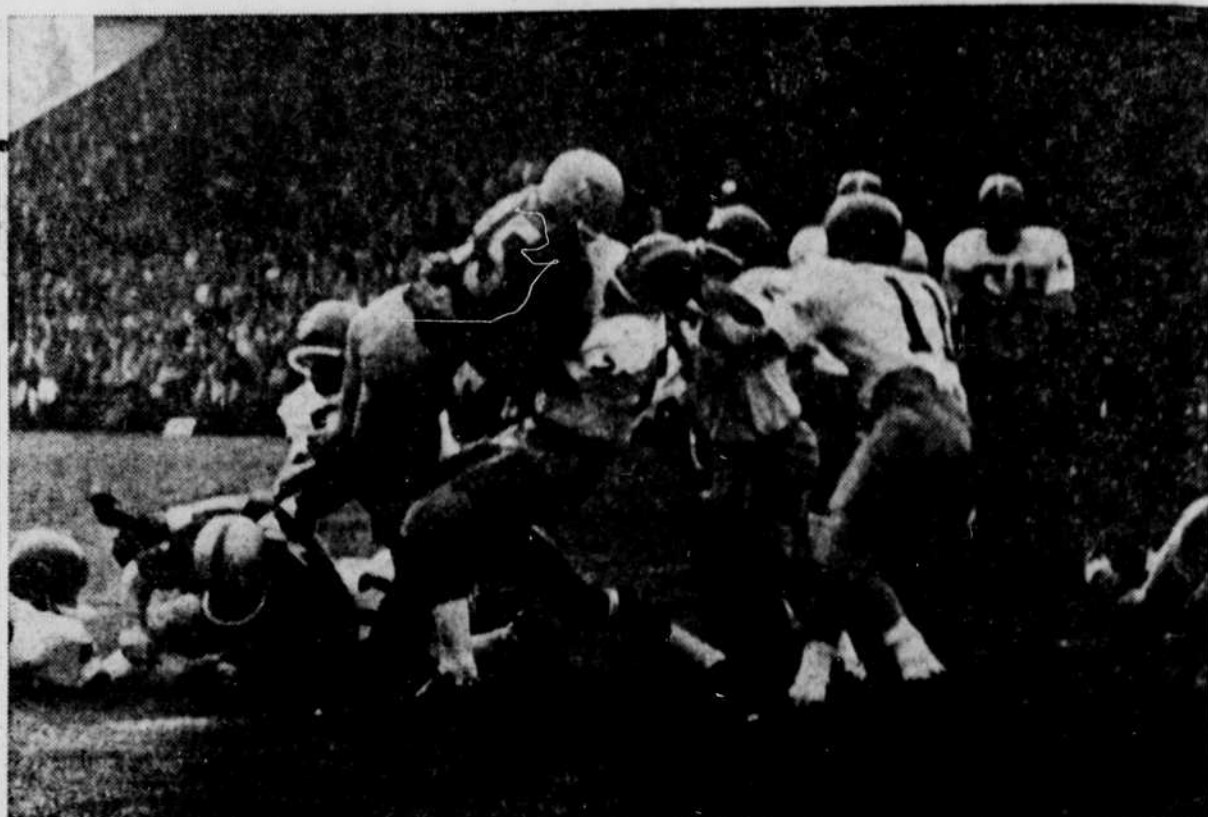
Sub quarterback Paul Grover called an efficient group of plays: he kept to the 28, sent Shanley and Tourville to the 19, kept to the 10, pitched to Morris on the three, but lost possession on the one, on a fourth-and-three situation as the frame ended.

The damage was done, however, for Kapp soon punted out to Tourville who brought the Ducks back to Cal's 39. Crabtree kept to the 34, pitched-out to Morris to the 23 and a first down, used a keeper and a pass to Willie West to move to the nine. From here, Ron Stover made a great catch for the TD. Morris' conversion was good, of course. Oregon 17, Cal 6.

California didn't fold up, however, and in eleven plays and three first downs drove to the UO 18. Here, Welch, Read and Aschbacher halted things with two yard-losing tackles, and Oregon launched its final drive.

Coach Casanova inserted his first unit with 6:17 left, and Morris, Shanley and Crabtree alternated with determination to the California 33. A pass to Ron Stover gave the Ducks their nineteenth first down, Tourville and Morris rambled to the ten, and then Crabtree called the same pass play twice.

Tourville ran right the first time, failed to see Shanley all alone in the end-zone, and threw

UO Gridders Pleased Following Cal Victory

It was a pleased Oregon Webfoot football team that entered the Hayward Field dressing room following their 24-6 victory over California's Golden Bears Saturday.

But it was not an elated team. They had done their job well and already they were thinking of their next hurdle against Stanford this Saturday at Palo Alto.

"We're playing them as they come," Webfoot coach Len Casanova has said repeatedly throughout the season. The Ducks have no time for elation until the last game is over and they showed that feeling Saturday. Oregon's Rose Bowl hopes loom bigger with every victory but thoughts of the Webfoot gridders point to their next games as the come.

Pete Elliot, California's likable new coach, said Oregon won

incomplete to Stover. On his second chance a few moments later, he waved cordially to both Stover and Shanley, but finally lobbed a nice pass to Shanley up against the north bleachers. Morris' PAT was partially blocked but dribbled over, and the Ducks had their fourth straight conference win tucked away.

Saturday because "they took the ball and sustained it. Give them credit. They're a fine club and well coached."

Casanova praised his team's defense, saying that Oregon's play "was as good a defensive effort as we've had."

"Our offensive effort was good, but not our best," he added. "We were stymied near their goal line too much. Their defense was tough inside the ten yard line."

"They scared hell out of us in the third quarter with that new formation. It took us that drive (Cal's third period TD march) to show us what they were doing."

"We were better in the second half," Elliott admitted. "We called more wide plays and blocked better."

Both coaches praised the Webfoot backs. "(Jim) Shanley, (Jack) Morris and (Charlie) Tourville too play great ball for Oregon," Elliot said after the game. Shanley gained 71 yards, Morris got 58 and Tourville ran for 84 more yards to lead the Webfoot ground attack which dented the Cal defenses for 272 yards.

Elliott refused to compare Oregon's team with others that the

Bears had faced but said, "Oregon has played well all year and they played well today."

Casanova was especially pleased with end Pete Welch's defensive play.

Three Webfoot gridders were injured during the contest. Tackle Jim Linden re-bruised his knee; reserve quarterback Sandy Fraser hurt his shoulder; and halfback LeRoy Phelps suffered from injured ribs.

And so the California game has passed. It was a key victory in the Webfoot Rose Bowl plans and was spiritedly followed by the packed Oregon rooting section. University students showed their enthusiasm at Friday night's rally as well as the game.

added 71 to make him a sure candidate for the All-Time UO rushing title (he needs only 98 more), and Morris had a field day blocking, kicking field goals and PATs and charging for 58 yards, which moved him into fourth place among Oregon rushees.

In his first starting opportunity, soph Bob Peterson turned in a tough, smart performance at center—regular Norm Chapman watched with a broken leg as Peterson held his own against Cal's monstrous Proverb Jacobs.

Reserve end Pete Welch turned in probably the game's most spectacular charge: he blocked a Cal punt in the second frame with a force that nearly deflated the ball, and he had some additional sparkling defensive moments.

Duck quarterback Jack Crabtree called a sensible offensive game for Oregon, had a good day with the option series, and continued his accurate throwing with four of seven completions.

Best news for California was the return of big Joe Kapp, the 200-pound quarterback who was sidelined early in the year with a punctured lung. Kapp ran and passed effectively, but he and halfback John Stewart were the only Bears to bother the Duck rush defenses noticeably.

Oregon won the pre-game coin-flip, but exchanged the pigskin twice with California before launching its first real touchdown assault. (Their first opportunity slipped past on the Cal 11, when three incompletes interrupted a 60-yard surge.)

LeRoy Phelps started the Ducks' first pay-dirt march with a 21 yard pass to Len Read, on the Cal 44. He and Chuck Osborne then alternated nice charges down to the 30, as the quarter ended. Jim Shanley pushed to the Cal 23, where the Bears took over for two plays, but dependable Harry Mondale snagged a Joe Kapp fumble to set the Ducks up again on the 30.

From here, Charley Tourville had runs of 11 and eight yards, Ron Stover took a short Crabtree pass, and Shanley took a pitchout

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
