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Webfoots Face Stanford Crucial

It's four down and four to go for Oregon's Pacific Coast Conference leading Webfoots and they'll be carrying their perfect conference record to Stanford Stadium this Saturday when they face Chuck Taylor's Indians.

Stanford proved their strength last Saturday with a solid 20-6 triumph over UCLA's favored Bruins and moved into Rose Bowl contention with a PCC record of two wins and one defeat.

The game sizes up to be the most crucial for both teams. The Ducks have victories over two Rose Bowl eligibles, California and Washington State, while the Indians lost their only game against a Pasadena possible to the Cougars, 21-18.

The Ducks have yet to face the versatility that they'll see in Stanford this weekend. With stocky quarterback Jack Douglas running the team, the Indians run well and pass well as shown in the UCLA game.

Against the Bruins, Douglas personally passed for two touchdowns and engineered a long drive which resulted in a third touchdown. The Indians racked up 212 yards on the ground and added another 138 through the air for a 350-yard total.

The running department is led by fullback Lou Valli, who made the second team on PCC all-star team in 1956, and his replacement, surprising Chuck Shea from Beaverton, Ore., who more than filled in for

shined that of Stanford in their first six games. The Ducks should be near the top in PCC defense statistics and have allowed their opponents an average of less than one TD a game.

Valli when he was injured earlier this season. Whether Shea starts may depend on Valli's condition.

The Indian line is big also and they seem to cater to big strong men, such as 225-pound tackle Don Manoukian and 242-pound tackle Chris Plain.

Oregon should be at near full strength Saturday with the return of end Bruce Brenn and guard Larry Newsom into the lineup. Both Brenn and Newsom saw action against California Saturday. It was Brenn's first appearance of the season.

Webfoots gridders, tackle Jim Linden, halfback LeRoy Phelps and quarterback Sandy Fraser received injuries during Saturday's contest, but only Fraser and his damaged shoulder appears to be on the doubtful list.

Oregon's main weapon may be their defense which has far out-

tory against Stanford since arriving at the University. Stanford has defeated the Ducks every year since 1951 except in 1952 when the Indians lost 21-20. Last year Stanford won 21-7 at Hayward Field.

The Webfoots leave by plane for Palo Alto Friday afternoon and will return early Saturday evening.



Local Title Won By Duck Harriers

Oregon placed five men in the top six at the Eugene Country club Monday, as the Duck cross country team added the Oregon AAU championship to its list of titles.

The Webfoots again neared a perfect 15 point score, picking up 18 points to second place Oregon State's 45, Lewis and Clark's 95, and Portland University's 111.

The meet was run in three heats with final places picked on the basis of times.

The top three clockings were posted in the meet's opening heat, as Duck junior Jim Grelle repeated his win of two weeks ago, covering the near-three mile distance in 14:21.

Oregon's Mark Robbins was second in the first heat and the final standings with a time of 14:30, and Beaver Don Ferguson was third in 14:32.

Bill Dellinger, U of O Olympian, ran the fastest time for the Country club course prior to Monday's race. Dellinger's record was 15:03, and will remain on the books as Oregon coach Bill Bowerman made a mistake in the course and plotted it 120 yards short.

Bowerman said, however, that it takes only about 20 seconds to cover the 120 yards at cross country pace, so all of the first three runners probably would have been under Dellinger's mark had the course been the right length.

Oregon's Phil Knight won the second heat in 14:43 to gain fourth place in the final placings. He was followed by Ducklings George Larson in 14:45, whose time gave him fifth place, and Webfoot Jim Bailey, who ran 15:05, to gain sixth.

Oregon freshmen Terry Boatman and Steve Schell waged a close battle for first place in the last heat, with Boatman winning out in 15:19. That time placed him tenth in the individual competition.

Meet director Bob Newland awarded small trophies to first and second place winners in each heat.

Bowerman announced after the meet that his harriers will not compete again until a week from Saturday, when they will travel to Portland to take on the Pilots again and possibly some other schools.

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
