

K. Ghent to Nominate Danforth Candidates

President O. M. Wilson has named Kenneth Ghent, associate professor of mathematics, to nominate to the Danforth Foundation two, or not more than three, candidates for the seventh class (1958) of Danforth Graduate Fellows. His title as nominator is Liaison Officer.

These fellowships are offered by The Danforth Foundation, an educational foundation located in St. Louis, Mo., to college senior men and recent graduates who are preparing themselves for a career of college teaching. The graduates must be planning to enter graduate school in September, 1958, for their first year of graduate study.

The Foundation welcomes applicants from the areas of natural and biological sciences, social sciences, humanities, and all fields of specialization to be found in the undergraduate college.

'Encouragement' Relationship

These appointments are fundamentally "a relationship of encouragement" throughout the years of graduate study, carrying a promise of financial aid within prescribed conditions as there may be need. The maximum annual grant for single Fellows is \$1,400 plus tuition and fees charged to all graduate students with an additional stipend of \$350 for children.

Students with or without financial need are invited to apply. A Danforth Fellow is allowed to carry other scholarship appointments, such as Rhodes, Fulbright, Woodrow Wilson, Marshall, etc., concurrently with his Danforth

Fellowship, and applicants for these appointments are cordially invited to apply at the same time for a Danforth Fellowship.

If a man receives the Danforth Appointment, together with a Rhodes Scholarship, Fulbright Scholarship, or Woodrow Wilson Fellowship, he becomes a Danforth Fellow without stipend, until those other relationships are completed.

Qualifications

The qualifications of the candidates as listed in the announcement from the Foundation are: men of outstanding academic ability, personality congenial to the classroom, and integrity and character, including serious inquiry within the Christian tradition.

All applications, including the recommendations, must be completed by January 31, 1958. Any student wishing further information should get in touch with Ghent.

All Danforth Fellows will participate in the annual Danforth Foundation Conference on Teaching, to be held at Camp Minnawanka in Michigan next September.

Struve to Discuss Stars, Galaxies

"Evolution of Stars and Galaxies" will be the title of the second Condon Lecture to be presented Thursday at 8 p.m. in the Student Union by Otto Struve, chairman of the Berkeley Astronomical Department of the University of California.

Tuesday night Dr. Struve gave an illustrated lecture on "The Solar System: Its Origins and Evolutions," featuring the Russian satellite, Sputnik.

Dr. Struve was born in Russia and received his early education there. He has taught and held positions at Yerkes Observatory, the University of Chicago and the University of Texas.

He has been chairman of the department of astronomy and director of the Leuschner Observatory at the University of California since 1950.

The Condon Lectures are sponsored by the state board of higher education and are open to the public.

Frosh Politicos Told Last Day To Petition

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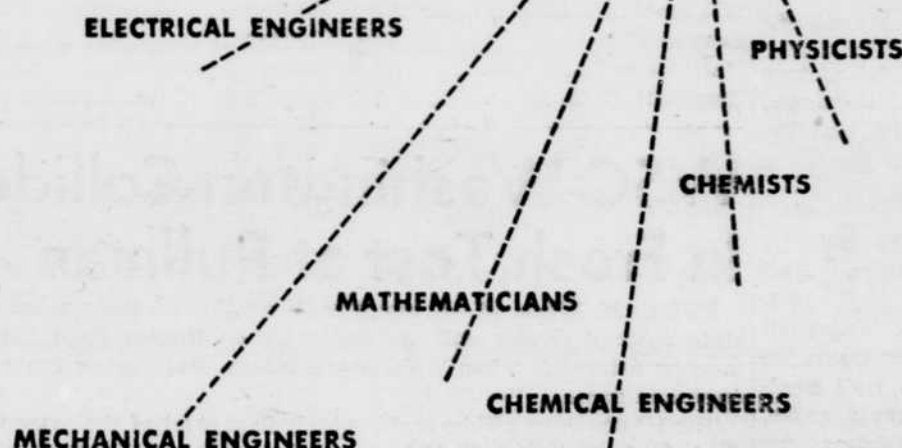
