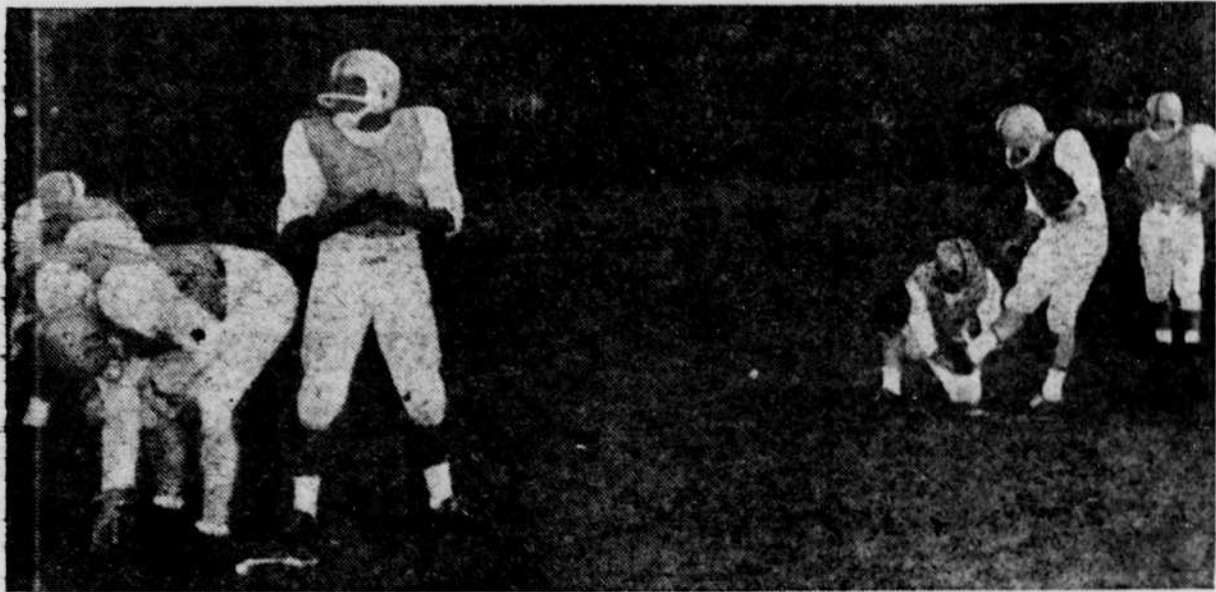


Oregon, Stanford Battle Saturday

Webfoots, Indians Meet In Conference Decisive

The Ducks have racked up four straight victories over UCLA (21-0), San Jose St. (26-0), Washington St. (14-13) and California (24-6) after a squeaky loss to Pittsburgh (6-3) and a tight, season-opening victory over Idaho (9-6).

But Stanford has equally impressive victories over UCLA, Northwestern, San Jose and Washington. Their only two losses came from Washington State, 21-13, and Rice, 34-7.

"I can't see them losing to Rice like that," Casanova said Thursday, "but Stanford does a pretty good job in their home grounds."

Casanova figures his Webfoots have a big job before them both offensively and defensively. "We'll have to defend against both running and passing with their quarterback (Jack Douglas) using this roll-out stuff."

"We'll have to watch Douglas on his passing and their backs who hit so many places with their running attack."

Statistics back up Casanova's concern for Stanford's offensive explosiveness. As a team, they've gained more yards than any other team in the PCC. Individually, Douglas rates second among PCC passers with 40 completed passes in 75 attempts for 492 yards, and fullback Chuck Shea from Beaverton tops the conference in

rushing with 472 yards gained in six games.

Stanford doesn't stack up with the Ducks in defense, but their hefty line, averaging almost 213 pounds, leaves no easy task for the Webfoot offensive attack.

The Webfoots may miss the service of two important second-unit backs. "I doubt if (LeRoy) Phelps will play Saturday although he may do some kicking and Sandy Fraser is a little doubtful also." Both boys suffered shoulder injuries in the California game last Saturday.

Aside from these two injuries and center Norm Chapman's fracture, the squad should be in top physical condition for the game.

One of the Webfoot strong points include the running of halfbacks Jim Shanley and Charley Tourville and fullback Jack Morris. Shanley, who rates second in PCC rushing figures, five yards behind Shea, may eclipse the all-time Webfoot rushing record this weekend.

The 170-pound senior has picked up 1631 yards in his two and a half years on the Oregon varsity, 98 yards short of George Bell's 1729 yards he gained in his 1946-49 college days.

Defensively, Oregon is unequaled by any PCC club. Six Webfoot opponents have managed to gain an average of only 132.7 yards on the ground and 97.7 through the air for a conference-leading total average of 230.3 yards.

If Fraser and Phelps make the trip, the Webfoots will send 37 players to the game including Norm Chapman who won't play Saturday. The tentative traveling squad:

Ducklings Try Rooks In First Grid Action

Oregon's promising Ducklings get their first close look at college football tomorrow night at Coos Bay, with a season-opener slated against OSC's Rooks.

Fresh Coach Jerry Frei said his team will leave for their southern Oregon destination at 1 p.m. Saturday, and will return around 12:30 p.m. Sunday.

Frei expects a real battle from the Oregon State freshmen, who won their initial game last weekend against Washington Frosh by a wide margin. "They'll be a tough outfit," he predicted. "They have Roger Johnson playing second string, you know." The Rooks reportedly own a heavy, talented forward line.

The Frosh coach expressed satisfaction with his own line, and reported "We have plenty of weight up front, with both guards and tackles averaging about 210 pounds."

With Californian Dick Arbuckle calling signals, the Ducklings will most likely depend on a passing attack in their first

game—Frei mentioned the roll-out, option series as a likely set of plays. "We have the potential to be a very strong ball-club, I think," was his final comment.
