

ASUO Constitutional Amendment Printed

In accordance with Section 2, Article VII, of the ASUO Constitution, the following proposed amendments to the ASUO constitution are hereby published. The election will be held Wednesday, November 13, in polling places to be announced. A two-thirds majority of all ballots cast is necessary for adoption. One third of all qualified voters must vote in the election.

It is hereby moved that Article VI of the ASUO Constitution be amended as follows:

Section II, Section III, and Section V are hereby repealed. Section II shall read as follows:

Positions elected at large. Positions elected at large shall include President, Vice President, and nine Senators at Large. Candidates for President shall be listed on a separate ballot. Their names shall also appear on the ballot for Senator at Large, in alphabetical order. The candidate for President receiving a majority or the last remaining candidate after the transfer of other ballots under the preferential system, as set forth in Article III of the by-laws, shall be declared President. The candidate for President receiving the second highest number of votes shall be declared Vice-President. The unsuccessful candidates for President shall be considered candidates for Senator at Large. Nine Senators at Large shall then be selected under the preferential system of voting as set out in Article III of the by-laws. In this election the Senator at Large votes for the successful candidates for President and Vice-President shall be redistributed according to second choice indicated on the ballots.

Section III shall read as follows:

In the election for class officers, each candidate shall designate the office sought (President or Representative) the candidate for President receiving a majority or the last remaining candidate after the transfer of other ballots under the preferential system, as set forth in Article III of the by-laws, shall be declared President. The candidate for President receiving the second highest number of votes shall be declared Vice-President. After the election of President and Vice-President, the remaining presidential candidates shall be declared defeated. The President and Vice-President shall retain the number of ballots needed for the quota for four offices to be filled, the remaining ballots shall be transferred to the candidates for representatives.

Grades and IQ's Related in Survey

High IQ's and long study hours won't always "cut the mustard" in college grade systems, according to a recent Illinois Institute of Technology survey.

Use of the study time and not the actual time spent studying is the main grade influencing factor. This seems to include using the library for its intended purpose instead of a date-getting base of operations.

But don't toss in the towel yet!

"The grades may not bear a close relation to the amount learned," says William D. Diemer, Illinois Tech mechanics instructor and survey maker.

The survey conducted by Diemer indicated little correlation between IQ's and grades even though student ability was considered.

Over 100 students from all walks of campus life and from all undergraduate classes were represented in the survey.

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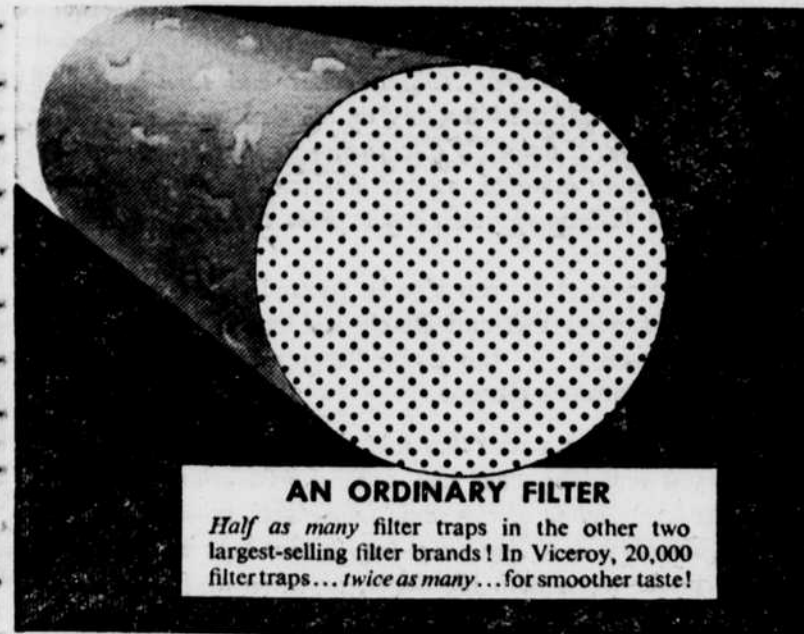
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
