Phi Delts Win Another For Perfect VB Slate

Two victories in straight games, two that went the three game limit and two easy forfeit wins resulted in Wednesday night volleyball action.

Phi Delta Theta retained their perfect record (now 3-0) by taking the last two sets from Alpha Tau Omega and Sigma Chi Alpha evened their record at 1-1 by taking two out of three games from Phi Kappa Psi in the closest games of the night.

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Ducks Stress Tackling As Sick List Dwindles

Oregon's front-running, one-by-one-ing Webfoots took another hard look at their defensive department in this week's third preparation session yesterday for Washington. The Ducks didn't stage a full-scale scrimmage Wednesday but ran through most of their usual pre-game repertoire in the cold afternoon session.

Because of a tackling performance against Stanford that left something to be desired, Coach Len Casanova had his able crew working on this vital defensive measure. Pass defenses came in for some attention, also, as Yellow and Green squads alternately threw the ball and defended against it.

The Oregon sick-list, of frightening size after last weekend's demanding Stanford thriller, was negligible Wednesday with some ailing players back for action and another due to work soon. Jim Shanley, who missed Monday's drill with a bad cold, was pronounced OK by Trainer Bob Officer, and looked fit as ever during the session.

The Oregon center situation, a real question mark after the loss of Norm Chapman and Dave Fish, brightened considerably as Larry Newsom returned from the doctor with a favorable verdict on his troublesome knee; the ex-Salem lineman has a broken blood vessel, and will probably give the center slot another try this afternoon.

Officer, better known as "Two-Gun", emphasized the terrific pounding received by the Oregonians in their 27-26 conquest of Stanford.

"Both teams really took a physical beating in that one—you don't play a game as close as that one was, or Washington State either, without feeling it," he related. "Generally, I think the team is in pretty good shape."

Against Washington, the Webfoots of Casanova hope to throw the same red-hot offensive thrust that carried them to their vital win last weekend at Palo Alto. Washington, coached for the first year by Jim Owens, is a team which usually busies itself with a rushing attack—the Huskies rank fourth in this department

on the Coast, and have one sensational back and two competent ones to make things go.

Husky Back a Sensation

The sensation is 188-pound Jimmy Jones, a steady-but-not-spectacular runner last year who leads the PCC in kickoff returns and has earned the name "Jet". A "Back of the Week" earlier in the fall, Jones received mention again this week. The two steadies are Dick Payseno and Mike McCluskey, not real break-away dangers like Oregon's speedsters, but good enough to warrant some concern by Casanova and Co.

Line-wise, Washington is huge at the tackle slots, average at center and end, and smallish at guard. This, they'll probably start with Tackles Dick Day (225) and Don McCumby (225), Ends Bruce Claridge (195) and Duane Lowell (195) or Ed Peasley (177), Guards Don Armstrong (177) and Whitey Core (185), and Center Dave Leland (192). Of these, traditionally Day should be the toughest for Oregon to stop—he was AP Lineman of the Week against Oregon last year.

Better plan on trekking to Portland with the rest of the campus come Saturday—the Ducks have the statisticians, the oddsmakers and a 5-0 record in their favor; the Huskies have lost one UO-Washington match in the last seven seasons.

Around the League

Coach Red Sanders is using new practice tactics in preparing UCLA for Washington State quarterback Bob Neuman, who leads the Pacific Coast Conference in passing and total offense.

Sanders had two "Neumans" throwing against the Bruin secondary simultaneously Tuesday.

Why two passers at the same time? "When you see Newman Saturday you'll know why," Sanders said.

Coach Jim Sutherland was concerned with fundamentals at the Washington State practice. He ran the Cougars through a long session of blocking and tackling. Fullback Ed Stevens was back at practice but favoring the injured knee that kept him out of the Oregon State game.

Stanford ran a prolonged scrimmage, priming for a game with Southern Cal at Los Angeles Saturday. Coach Chuck Taylor had halfback Jack Taylor and tackles Armand DeWeese and Kirk Reid place kicking for that extra point after touchdown that has lost Stanford two games this season. Bad passing from center and defensive rushing ruined a majority of the attempts.

So Cal Defenses

Southern Cal worked mostly on stopping Stanford's running game with the emphasis on the Indians' pitchout play.

"Sure, we're concerned with Jackie Douglas' passing," Coach Don Clark said, "but remember Chuck Shea and Al Harrington can really run that ball for Stanford."

Coach Jim Owens called it a "good practice" after the Washington squad scrimmaged for two hours. He said the Huskies still have much to do before meeting conference leading Oregon. Jimmy Jones and guard Witey Core were named as co-captains for the game. They were co-captains when Washington beat Oregon State for its only victory.

Stop Frances, Beamer???

"We will have to stop Earnel Durden and Joe Francis around the ends and Nub Beamer up the center if we expect to beat Oregon State," California Coach Pete Elliott told his Bears.

Two fullbacks, John Horrillo and Jim Stinnette, missed Oregon State's practice. Horrillo suffered a torn knee cartilage and Stinnette a pulled muscle.
