World Affairs Panel Raps U.S. Policies

A World Affairs Week panel delved into the complex issues of foreign policy Thursday afternoon at 4 p.m. The topic of the discussion held in the SU Dad's Lounge was "The Present State of Our Foreign Policy."

History and political science professor Paul S. Dull said that the United States tends to follow a short-range foreign policy of combating crises as they arise instead of planning a long-range policy. Referring to Dulles' "brink of war" statement, he said, "More often we use brinkmanship instead of statesmanship."

Russian Policies

Harold Fisher, director emeritus of the Hoover Institute and

library at Stanford University, said that the Communist Party does not form the policies of the Russian government. He said Russia had been interested in the Middle East from the time she became a nation and that, "Russia would still be a threat in the Middle East if she were under a Czar instead of the Communists."

Kline Swygard, a political science professor from OSC, recently returned from a two-year stay in the Far East. He said: "I noticed less insecurity in those under the shadow of the Bamboo Curtain than I noticed in Corvallis." He also commented that we had not been given credit in our aid to many foreign countries.

Underdog

Paul Varg, visiting professor of history from Ohio State University, said that the American desire to side with the underdog has caused crises in our relationship with the NATO countries. He stressed the need "to step on the toes of our allies less."
