With finals in the offing, religious houses have curtailed their activities, as has the campus. Very few groups have reported happenings other than their usual program.

Hatfield Claims Principles Vital

Secretary of State Mark Hatfield presented an informal talk to the Oregon chapter of Inter-Varsity Christian Fellowship Tuesday evening in the Dads' Club Lounge of the Student Union.

Non-political in scope, Hatfield's theme had to do with the "need for practical evidence of Christianity in everyday living." He said that Christian principles should be a vital part of campus life, business life, civil rights questions, political issues, and even athletic contests.

"Christian faith does not come to us through the bloodstream or the color of our skin," continued Hatfield. "It is not the result of being born an American." He pointed out that true Christianity may be "proved" through attempting to share it with someone else: "The real test of learning is to be able to share it with someone else."

Hatfield suggested that Christians need to acquire greater "spiritual maturity" through faith; that faith results partly from spiritual knowledge; that spiritual knowledge, in turn, results from a study of the Bible. He emphasized the importance of prayer to the Christian life.

In conclusion, Hatfield suggested that, "Christianity must be living, not just talking."

Similar Movement

In England, a similar movement was started in the industrial city of Sheffield. The success of the Detroit mission? In the words of Rev. White's assistant, the Rev. Scitt Paradise, the mission is "succeeding, very definitely. The fact that it has survived and grown is a measure of its success."

The American Motors Corporation has announced a program along this same line. It is adding to its staff ten new specialists: top clergymen (five Protestant, three Roman Catholic, and two Jewish).

They are to advise the corporation on the "ethical aspects" of the new contract negotiations with the United Automobile Workers union.

IRC Conference Hosts 115 Here

The University hosted about 115 delegates representing 13 schools and 5 states, Dec. 6, 7 attending the Northwest Conference of International Relations Clubs.

A panel discussion of foreign aid issues opened the conference Friday. Roundtable discussions followed by a noon luncheon completed the morning session.

The University of British Columbia was selected to hold next year's conference, and under conference rules the president, sec-

retary and treasurer of the organization are named by the host school.

Friday's activities closed with an evening banquet that featured Kline Swygard of Oregon State College who addressed the group on "Inside Thailand." A Saturday luncheon closed the two-day conference.

George Brandt, president of the University IRC, was host for the meetings. He was assisted by ASUO Senator Bud Titus.
