Two long forward passes with the ball landing in the arms of Eddie Casey, All-American halfback, a 14-yard run around Oregon's right end in the second quarter and the goal that followed related how the Mass. men registered their only touchdown."

Frosh Streak Snapped By Dental Five, 73-71

Oregon's Frosh cagers, unbeaten in 19 games over a two-year span, finally fell by the wayside Wednesday night as a pair of game-ending free tosses rocketed Oregon's Dental School to a heartbreaking 73-72 victory on the McArthur Court hardwoods.

Trailing, 33-31, at halftime, Don Kirsh's Duckling five roared back in the final section to move into a 70-67 lead with 1:25 remaining to play.

With the Frosh ahead, 72-71, Dent School forward Gurnar Christiansen, ex-Stanford player, was fouled on an attempted jump shot as the final buzzer sounded, and was awarded two free tosses. His first underhanded effort swished the net for 72-72; the second raced around the hoop before dropping through for the final 73-72.

Denny Strickland led Frosh scorers with 15 points. Ron Anderson and Butch Kimpton each had ten.

The defeat was the Frosh's first since the 1955-56 season. Oregon's '56-57 Duckling aggregation had a perfect 15-0 slate, while the current squad had been unbeaten in their first four games.

The Ducklings opened the '57-58 season by thrashing Columbia Basin, 92-58. The Frosh led, 45-26, at the intermission and poured on the coal in the final half to win going away. Kimpton took scoring honors with 19 markers. Tim Hindman trailed with 14.

A 90-50 victory over Centralia, Wash., JC marked the Frosh's second outing. Oregon held a 14-point halftime advantage and again opened the gap in the second period. Kimpton sank 22 points in this one; Strickland had 15.

Lower Columbia JC was the third Duckling victim, falling 76-40. Strickland's 13 points was high for the contest, which saw the Frosh roll to a 39-20 halftime advantage.

Hennen & Vos, a Eugene AAU five, gave the Ducklings some trouble in the first half before succumbing, 70-47, and becoming the fourth scalp on the Frosh skein. Oregon fought for a 31-24 intermission margin, then coasted to the triumph in the final round. Leon Hayes and Kimpton tied for scoring laurels with 10 digits each.

Prior to Wednesday's encounter with ODS, Frosh mentor Kirsch remarked that the fact that his charges had won four straight games was not a true measure of their ability, inasmuch as all four opponents were inferior in height and shooting skill to the rangy Ducklings.

"Many things still need improvement", Kirsch said. The Frosh have a long layoff period from now until Jan. 6, 1958, which may hurt the Ducklings somewhat when they take on Clark College at Vancouver, Wash., on Jan. 14. "This game should be our big test, Kirsch commented.

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
