'Deferred Rush May be Forced'

"Unless the present system is changed deferred rush will be forced on the fraternities," Dean of Men Ray Hawk told the Inter-Fraternity Council Thursday night.

Hawk explained that extreme pressure is being brought against the faculty by parents, who he said, have termed the present rush system "barbaric."

He told the fraternity presidents that strong sentiments were aroused on the subject during his various visits with University officials parent meetings throughout the state.

"Unless the fraternities work something out to make the parents happy, they may be forced with a situation like Oklahoma, where the houses were given ten days to formulate a deferred rush system," Hawk said.

Parents United

Hawk said that about 90% of the parents were in favor of deferred rush, with some even preferring that rush be held back for one year.

"To say that the fraternities could not govern themselves is the weakest argument used against deferred rush," Hawk said. "To flick in the towel because such a system could not be enforced would put the fraternities in a weak position," he added.

"The handwriting is on the wall," Hawk told the members. "Deferred rush may not be this year or the next, but it is inevitable."

Feelings Against Program

Hawk said he believed that most of the fraternity presidents who seem against deferred rush are forced to take such a stand because of the feelings of the members within the houses. "These men should be told of the situation," he said.

Currently, IFC has the power to decide on its own type of rush system. Last spring term IFC selected the present rush system.

OSP Chairmen Deny Party End

Oregon Students Party co-chairman Margaret Wells Thursday night denied rumors that the party had disbanded.

Miss Wells added that she and the other OSP co-chairman, Jackie Krause, were dropping out of school at the end of the term, but that the party had not disbanded.

Miss Wells said she assumed that Bill Vertrees, publicity chairman, would assume leadership of the party.

Some discussion of disbanding had been carried on informally, she said.

OSP recently sponsored an amendment calling for a constitutional convention that failed because the required number of students (one-third of the student body) did not vote.

Michigan State Econ Professor Named BA Dean

Richard Wadsworth Lindholm, professor of economics in the school of business and public services of Michigan State University, will come to Oregon July 1, 1958 as the new dean of business administration.

The confirmation of Lindholm's appointment was announced Tuesday at a Portland meeting of the State Board of Higher Education.

Lindholm graduated from Gustavus Adolphus college and has received his masters degree from the University of Minnesota and a doctorate from the University of Texas.

He has been a member of Michigan State's faculty since 1948. Prior to that time he served as assistant professor of economics and finance at Ohio State university; held the rank of captain in the U.S. Army Military Intelligence Organization; was assistant professor of economics and finance at Texas A. and M. college; and was an instructor at both the University of Texas and the Minnesota College of St. Thomas.

Has Written Books

The new dean has written several books on economics including "Principles of Money and Banking Related to National Income and Fiscal Policy" published in 1954 by the Norton Publishing Co. of New York, and a book of lectures, "Money Banking and Economic Development in Free Vietnam." He was co-author of "The Michigan Economy to 1970. A Study in Growth" in 1955.

Currently Lindholm is editor of a Michigan State University Press project titled "The Experiment of Vietnam," and serves as co-author of a high

2000 Students Plan Trek South; You Know Why

An estimated 2000 students will leave for southern California shortly after Christmas to attend the year's Big Event—the New Year's Day Rose Bowl game in Pasadena.

The Oregon Ducks, Pacific Coast Conference co-title holders with Oregon State College, will meet Ohio State, champion of the Big Ten Conference.

The Buckeyes, coached by Woody Hayes, have been rated favorite over Len Casanova's Webfoots. Oregon finished the regular season with a 7-3 won-lost record. Ohio State was defeated by Texas Christian in its first game of the season, then went on to pile up eight straight wins without a loss.

The Duck football team began practice for the game Wednesday, opening with light workouts. Under the rules, each team is allowed 16 practices before the game.

Casanova said he was unsure of a practice schedule for next week because of final examinations.

The team will leave Dec. 21 for Los Angeles, making its headquarters in the Ambassador Hotel. The Ducks will drill at Bovard Field, which is used for practice by the USC Trojans.
