 school textbook on the position of fiscal economist to be published by Harcourt, Brace, in 1958.

In 1955-56 Lindholm held the position of fiscal economist to the Republic of Vietnam in Saigon. He was granted a year's leave of absence in 1953 as a Fulbright lecturer in economics at the University of Punjab, Lahore, Pakistan, and as financial advisor to that nation's government. Earlier, in 1950, he had been granted a year's leave to serve as fiscal economist with the Federal Reserve Board in Washington, D.C. of St. Thomas.

Board Member

He was a member of the Economic Advisory Board to the Governor of Michigan in 1954.

The Michigan educator holds membership in the National Tax association, the American As-

sociation of University Professors, the American Economic association, the American Finance association, and is currently an active member of the Michigan Legislative Tax Study Group.

Lindholm will fill the post vacated last summer by the retirement of Dean Victor P. Morris, who has been head of the school since 1926, was appointed first holder of the Miner chair in business administration following his resignation as dean.
