Petitions for subchairmen for Dad's Weekend are due by 5 p.m. Friday, according to weekend co-chairman Lynn Yarnell. The petitioners are to use regular petition blanks and to return them to the third floor of the Student Union.

Positions open are publicity, promotions, tickets, general secretary, hostess selection, luncheon, and Dad's dance.

Petitions for the Frosh Snowball committees and committee chairmanships will be due Friday at 5 p.m. Positions are open on six committees, including properties and arrangements, refreshments, band and entertainment, programs and invitations, publicity and decorations.

Petitions for Dad's Weekend subchairmanships are now due. Positions open are hostess selection, publicity, promotions, ticket sales, luncheon, dad's dance, and registration.

All petitions must be turned in to the ASUO petition box on the third floor of the Student Union by 5 p.m. Friday. Interview times will be announced later.

Career Booklet To Be Distributed

Distribution of the 1958 edition of "Career: for the College Man" was begun on the campus today through Gamma Alpha Chi, national advertising fraternity for women.

The career booklet will be distributed through the departments and schools at Oregon and will be available at the Graduate center at Student Affairs.

Over 100 of America's leading industrial companies have helped to write this annual guide to business opportunities and have paid for its distribution on over 600 American college campuses.

The book shows that engineers are again in heavy demand, but more and more "technical companies" such as Curtiss-Wright and Allied Chemical find their 1958 requirements for Liberal Arts majors swelling.

The College Interview Index is a unique feature of the booklet this year. The complete cross-reference shows recruiting season visits planned by employers at over 200 campuses across the nation. Thousands of company listings assist students to plan in advance their complete job campaigns.

Music Leaders To Hold Confab

The seventh annual conference on music education will be held on the campus Jan. 17 and 18.

Featured will be the presentation of a session on the contributions of science to the improvement of music and musical instruments. Earle Kent, director of the Conn Research Laboratories of Elkhart, Indiana, will be in charge of the session.

The program will include clinics for various instruments, exhibits of music and musical equipment, reading sessions, and performances by student groups.

Experts from the several fields of music will be in charge of clinics for their fields, according to Mox Risinger of the university to Max Risinger of the university arrangements for the conference. Many of the experts are from music centers outside the state.

The conference, developed out of a reading "clinic" started in 1952 by Robert Vagner of the music school here and was expanded at the request of state music educators. It is now sponsored by the university music school and held annually on this campus.
