gon Students Party candidate, by 900 votes. Students also named: Chuck Cowan, senior class president; George Brandt, junior class president; Tom Creager, sophomore class president. ASUO president Darrel Brittsan placed himself in a tree on 13th and University — and finally climbed down when student contributions to the Millrace Drive reached \$3000, climaxing "Millrace Day" festivities. Larrilyn Carr was named Oregon editor for the next year. Sue Walcott was crowned queen of the Junior Prom as students danced to the music of Les Brown and his band. IFC voted to hold rush week the first week of school (orientation week) for the fall of 1957. Jim Smith was elected new chairman of the Student Union Board. Hoagy Carmichael—along with University of Oregon mothers—was honored guest at Canoe Fete-Junior Weekend festivities. A basement fire at the Student Union caused an estimated \$400 damage.

Oregon's baseball Ducks won the northern division title and won the right to meet the California Bears for the PCC title. Gordon Wright, head of the history department, announced his resignation and intent to teach at Stanford University. The AWS legislature approved a new list of women's regulations, set to go into effect in the fall.

September

Millrace restoration drive chairman Jim Perry and Emerald editor Mitchelmore traveled to the Pitt-Oregon game at Portland the hard way—up the Willamette River by canoe as part of a publicity stunt for the 'Race fund drive. A total of 334 men pledged fraternities during fall term rush. Raymond Massey and Agnes Moorhead starred in "The Rivalry" at Mac Court.

October

Charles Schulz, creator of the "Peanuts" cartoon strip, visited the campus as guest of the Oregon High School Press Conference. Inter-campus educational television made its debut here as history professor Wendell Stephenson lectured via TV to about 200 students attending class at the University, OCE, OSC and Willamette. The state high

school-college relations committee voted to suspend senior visitation weekends for at least one year—thus letting out Duck Preview for 1958. Displaying "pre-game spirit," an estimated 300-400 students tackled police at 13th and Kincaid when officers tried to break up a street dance. Students surrounded a police car, removed the mirror, license plate, bent the aerial, took a flashlight, let the air out of the tires, and stole a policeman's hat. The next day the Ducks trounced Cal 24-6. Sharon Hewett and Gene Nudelmann were selected Betty Coed and Joe College. The Skinner's Butte "O" was stolen from the Butte by a band of OSC Teke pledges, to be returned in tattered pieces just before the Homecoming game in November.

November

Oregon edged Stanford 27-26 in one of the most thrilling games ever seen by Duck fans. OSC Homecoming queen Pearl Friel was "stolen" for a few hours by Order of the O men, but returned in time for Aggie HC festivities. Fred Waring presented his "Hi-Fi Holiday" at Mac Court. The constitutional amendment for a change in voting procedure was defeated again—when only 1896 students voted and a required total of one-third (1965) was needed. Oregon cinched a bid to the Rose Bowl with a 16-7 win over USC. Queen Mary Jo Fourier reigned over Homecoming—but the weekend was saddened by a 10-7 loss to OSC. OSC students—11 of 'em—were caught and heads shaved when they attempted to "raid" the campus. Classes were suspended from 11 a.m. on Nov. 25 as the University celebrated an official bid to the Rose Bowl. The Senior Six of Phi Beta Kappa was tapped: Dave Cass, David Moursund, Marion Baum, Margery Ziniker, Mary Jo Fourier and Erik Hansen.

Traineeship Grants Made Available

One-year traineeship grants of \$1600 for the University of Oregon's graduate training in vocational rehabilitation counseling are available for this academic year, and are eligible for renewal for a second year, according to Phil H. Schoggen of the department of psychology.

In its second year of operation, the graduate training program is supported by the Office of Vocational Rehabilitation. The major field in the program is psychology. The program normally involves two years of graduate work, which leads to a masters degree in psychology.

A student must have a bachelor's degree and a good undergraduate record to be eligible for admission to the program.

December

A constitutional amendment for a constitutional convention failed when only 627 of the needed 1965 voted. Dave Brubeck, Cal Tjader and Lee Konitz performed in "Jazz a la Carte" at the Student Union. Delores Mezyk, DG freshman, was named Sweetheart of Sigma Chi. Dan Arensmeier was selected new yell king by the Senate. Richard Wadsworth Lindholm of Michigan State University was named new dean of business administration. Dean of Men Ray Hawk told the IFC that "Unless the present system is changed deferred rush will be forced on fraternities," because of extreme pressure by the parents who have termed the present rush system "barbaric." Allen Johnson and Gary Capps were named by the publications board as Emerald editor and business manager, respectively, from January until May of 1958.

Cass Comes Close To Rhodes Award

University senior Dave Cass narrowly missed being named one of four Rhodes Scholars from the Northwest region in competition during the Christmas vacation.

Cass, a senior in economics from Eugene, qualified as a state representative along with Jim Gunton of Linfield. Gunton was named as a Rhodes Scholar in the Spokane eliminations.

Other candidates for the state honor from the University were William Cook, senior in journalism, and Craig Phillips, senior in history.
