

**ENTERED THROUGH BASEMENT****Late-Hours 'Visitor' Flees After Guideless Suzy Tour**

An unidentified man, about 30 years old, entered Susan Campbell frosh women's dorm early Sunday morning wearing only a pair of shoes.

No dorm residents were harmed by the man.

Reports from Susan Campbell, student affairs and the president's office indicated that he gained entry to the dorm through a basement window.

He then proceeded to go to the

third floor and attempted to enter one of the sleeping porches, but was unable to get in when the door was held against him, reports said.

Apparently, screams by the women frightened the man. It was believed that he left by the front door.

He left no clothes in the dorm, although the man may have had a jacket in his possession.

Police were called immediately

but the culprit escaped before they arrived.

There was no indication that the man was intoxicated, reports said.

Similar events have reportedly happened recently at Oregon State College, when a disrobed man has been said to have jumped out of his car when women pass by, then has fled the scene. Corvallis police have been alerted for the man.

**School Assemblies Slated for Tuesday**

Assemblies prepared in the interest of students' selection of a major have been scheduled by a majority of the University's professional schools and departments for 1 p.m. Tuesday.

Speaker at the school of architecture and allied art's assembly in the school's conference room will be Lloyd Reynolds of Reed College.

Another Portlander, Arthur M. Cannon, a graduate of the University, will talk at the school of business administration assembly on "The Investment Outlook" in Commonwealth 138.

**Education Topic Given**

A panel discussion on "Why are There Criticisms of Education" will be featured at the school of education assembly in Education 315. Moderator will be A. C. Hearn, professor of education.

Dean A. A. Esslinger will be the featured speaker at the school of health and physical education assembly.

"The Lawyer's Opportunities" will be the topic of Circuit Judge A. T. Goodwin of Eugene, who will speak to all pre-law students at the law school assembly in Fenton 3.

Topic of a visiting speaker from Salem, Tom Wright, administrative assistant to the Governor, will be "Front Row Seat at the State House" at the journalism assembly in Allen 221.

Music majors and all those interested may attend a talk by Theodore Kratt, dean of the school of music.

**Discuss Job Opportunities**

Programs of the liberal arts schools will be directed toward both majors and lower division students. Job opportunities in the areas of foreign languages and philosophy will also be reviewed.

Highlight of the chemistry department program will be a film, "Modern Alchemy—the Story of Trab-uranium Elements."

"What Economists are Interested In" will be discussed by three faculty members of the 1957 program of the American Economist Association to be held in Commonwealth 137.

**Math Schedules Two**

The mathematics department will hold two meetings, one for lower division students (Deady 106) and the other for upper division majors (Deady 102). Simi-

lar programs have been planned by the English (Friendly 105), sociology (Commonwealth 243), and speech (Villard 102) departments.

Members of the staff of the sociology club will comment briefly and a short talk will be given by club president, Ray Logan, for the benefit of lower division students in Commonwealth 243.

**Petitions Asked For Senate Posts**

The posts of senator-at-large and junior class representative are open on the ASUO Senate. Petitions for the post will be due Wednesday at 5 p.m. in the ASUO petition box, Student Union third floor, according to Jim Lynch, ASUO President.

The vacancies were created when junior representative Mike DeVore and senator-at-large Chuck Hale failed to make a 2.0 GPA fall term.

**Requirements Listed**

Requirements for the junior representative post are junior class standing, a 2.0 GPA and a 2.0 GPA fall term.

Any undergraduate student may petition for the senator-at-large post who has at least 12 hours of credit with a 2.0 GPA.

Lynch said a screening committee will be set up if a large number of students petition. Otherwise, all the petitioners will be interviewed by the ASUO Senate at the Thursday night meeting.

**Today Last Chance For Annual Photos**

Today will be the last day to have Oregon pictures taken. The studio, in the Student Union basement, will be open until 5 p.m. for the photos.

Portrait orders promised up to Jan. 20 may be picked up at the SU studio, which will be open for business Tuesday and Wednesday. All proofs must be returned, and the balance for picture proofs must be paid, or the pictures will not appear in the yearbook.

**Wilson, McGinty Talk Dry Zone; Licenses Aired**

The University's attitude toward the now illegal dry zone will be sounded out in a meeting between University President O. Meredith Wilson and Eugene Mayor John McGinty.

It is not known whether or not the meeting will be held before the City Council meeting tonight at 7:30. On the Council's agenda will be three pending applications from establishments inside the old dry zone limits for package beer licenses.

Applicants are the Safeway Store at E. 13th Ave. and Moss, The Foodland Market at 661 E. 19th Ave. and Miller's Grocery at 1065 E. 20th Ave.

**Applications Returned**

The council, in November, endorsed the applications, which were then sent to the Oregon Liquor Control Commission. They were returned without further action because the stores were located within the dry zone. The OLCC then requested an opinion from Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton, who ruled that there was no legal basis for the area limitations.

C. F. Shearer, president of the City Council, said Friday that he would "hate to see the City Council take hasty action." The Uni-

At present, Cannon is serving on the board of directors of the Seattle firm, W. C. Nickum and Sons.

Cannon graduated from the University of Oregon with the B.A. and M.A. degrees and is a member of Phi Beta Kappa.
