## Auto Insurance Rates To Rise This Month

SALEM (P) — State Insurance Commissioner Hugh H. Earle announced Monday he has approved a 30 per cent increase in automobile insurance rates for stock companies that write about 55 per cent of the insurance in Oregon.

The increase will go into effect Jan. 22. The principal increase is in liability insurance.

Earle said that the increase is necessary to protect the companies from losing money.

The increase does not apply to mutual and others companies which don't belong to the group. The others haven't yet sought an increase.

## Sen. Morse Slams Dam Budget Cut

WASHINGTON (P) — Sen. Wayne Morse (D-Ore.) said Monday that the President's budget "continues the policy of starving federal multi-purpose development in an attempt to enforce its bankrupt partnership policy upon the people of the region who have repeatedly rejected it at the polls."

"The amount requested for John Day Dam, two million dollars, is a fraction of what is required for maximum progress on this great multipurpose dam," Morse said.

"Everyone knows that the Columbia Basin region faces a major power shortage in the years ahead. The low-cost power from John Day is indispensable in averting that shortage. Yet the Republican administration, by its budget proposal, continues the indefensible policy of stretching out the planning and construction of the million-kilowatt dam," he said.

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
