

Swedish Skiers Boost Duck Team

Skiing has attracted lots of people in recent years who had not previously been acquainted with the snow and hills. At least three of Oregon's ski team, however, have had long experience with the winter sport.

Hemming "Hank" Hakansson, an exchange student, from Sweden, is captain of the team. A senior, Hank placed second last year in the slalom at the Winter Carnival and was third in overall standings.

He has consistently been on the honor roll, and is majoring in business administration—his dad is in the lumber business in Sweden. Besides skiing, Hemming does some hurdling for the track team. He came to the United States through the Swedish-American Foundation.

Paula Cook, a sophomore, has been skiing since she was eight. She has won three medals at Sun Valley—second in the Sun Valley Ski Club Races in the junior division, third in the same races later in the intermediate, and the Silver Sun, which is awarded after passing a downhill run against time. At the Winter Carnival, Paula took thirds in the slalom and in the downhill.

Her dad was instrumental in building the Tomahawk Ski Bowl near Klamath Falls which is her home. And according to Paula, the five runs in the Bowl are better than the Mount Hood runs.

Another Swede, Tarmo Tikka, who has been in this country only since September, specializes in the cross-country. Staying at Chi Psi, Tarmo is a junior in journalism with emphasis on advertising. Although able to ski for about five months of every year in Sweden, Tarmo has yet to ski in Oregon.

He also came here through the Swedish-American Foundation. Currently he is writing articles for newspapers and magazines in his own country. He says he writes about American dating and all of the things that a foreign visitor is expected to write home about. Though he himself he said hasn't had much experience in dating, he gets the facts (?) from his friends.

Ike Requests Less For Oregon Jobs

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower Monday asked Congress to appropriate 18 per cent less for Oregon and Washington projects in the coming year than was requested for current work.

In the 1958 fiscal year, beginning July 1, the region will need \$121,340,000, the President said. This compared with 144,437,600 asked for similar projects in fiscal 1957.

Bonneville Power Administration construction needs were estimated at \$21,000,000, far down from the \$30,800,000 requested a year ago and the \$22,038,000 appropriated by Congress.

A dozen power projects will need \$64,531,000, Eisenhower said, with Ice Harbor Dam getting 20 million of it. Other dam requests included 13 million for The Dalles and 11 million for Hills Creek.

Reclamation requests totaled \$26,687,000, with \$8,395 for the

Columbia Basin project and \$9,500,000 for the Talent Division of Oregon's Rogue River.

The Talent Division figure includes funds for completion of Howard Prairie Dam and delivery canal; the Keene Creek Dam and the Green Springs power plant, and further work on Emigrant Dam.
