For the second consecutive year, a retailing program that is operated through Lipman Wolfe & Co. and White Stag Manufacturing Co. is being sponsored by the department of business administration. The program gives participating students an opportunity to buy from manufacturing houses, display, promote and sell merchandise in a retail store.

Now enlarged to include students from the Journalism and Art schools as well as other interested participants, students work for two terms planning the buying, display promotion and selling campaigns for their merchandise. Sizeable allotments have been made available for the complete merchandising program, Peter Bluett, promotions chairman said.

The program was initiated by Dodge and the executives from Lipman Wolfe & Co. Originally, the program was designed so that students would take over management of the Lipman store for one day. It was felt that only the persons in executive positions benefitted from that presentation; therefore, the program was replaced with the present one—giving all participants equal experience in the merchandising field.

Bluett said the program was very successful last year and indicated that the department of business administration expects it to be an annual event. Two hours of credit are issued to participants.

Scholarship Given At BA Assembly

Bruce M. Brenn received the \$500 Autzen Foundation scholarship yesterday at the School of Business Administration assembly.

The Boise, Idaho, senior concentrates his study in the field of foreign trade. He received the award on the basis of "scholarship, leadership, and indicated success in a business career."

Arthur M. Cannon, speaker for the assembly and vice-president of Standard Insurance Co. in Portland, forecast an upward trend in economic activity in the latter part of 1958 after a slight decline at the beginning of the year.

He suggested that there is no question about whether or not the United States can produce enough during the year to take care of itself; the question is, as he sees it, whether the nation will produce the "right" things necessary for proper defense and economic stability.

In line with his topic, "The Investment Outlook," Cannon outlines a basic investment program for would-be investors, suggesting in order: a cash reserve equal to approximately one month's salary, life insurance, residential real estate, and investments of a more speculative nature.
