State bond director George Minnaugh said the sales exceeded by nearly \$400,000 the bonds purchased in Oregon in a comparable period of 1956.

U.S. Leads World In Foreign Study

More than 75,000 international scholarships and fellowships are offered by governments, universities, foundations and other institutions in 83 states and territories.

A survey covering the years 1955-56 by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, showed that an estimated total of 140,744 students were studying outside their countries.

The United States leads the world in the number of students from foreign countries with a total of 36,494. Next is France with 16,877.

The United States also holds the lead among countries offering fellowships with 21,000, followed by France with 8000. More than twice as many of these grants are available to American students than to those of any other country.

State Sen. Belton May Enter Race

CANBY, Ore. (AP)—State Sen. Howard Belton of Canby said Wednesday "it is too early to say" if he would become the third candidate for Republican nomination as governor of Oregon.

"I have had many requests that I run, but I haven't made any decision yet," he said.

Belton was asked about his plans in view of Secretary of State Mark Hatfield announcing his candidacy Wednesday. Belton said Hatfield's announcement would not push him into an early announcement of his own plans.

"It is not something a person wants to decide hastily," Belton said.
