

# Hatfield Opposes Unander For Republican Nomination

Runs for governor

Secretary of State Mark Hatfield Wednesday announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination for governor, to oppose State Treasurer Sig Unander.

Hatfield, in his statement, said that he "had been besieged by sincere people who believe that it is my duty to give the Republicans of Oregon a free choice in an open primary."

## Three Democrats

Democratic opposition will be supplied by Gov. Robert D. Holmes, who is seeking re-election, former state senator Lew Wallace, and Wiley Smith, Multnomah County assessor.

Senator Wayne Morse, recently reaffirmed his support of Gov. Holmes in a release, which said in part "I am confident that the vitality of the Democratic party under Bob Holmes' leadership has the confidence of the voters and will lead us to victory in November."

## Primary May 16

The state primary election will be held May 16. Recent additions to the contest have resulted in the phenomenon that all three members of the State Board of Control, Holmes, Hatfield, and Unander, are candidates for governor.

## College Enrollment Creates Problem

PORTLAND (AP)—Oregon's tax-supported colleges must double in size in 10 years unless tighter entrance requirements are created, a state education official said here Wednesday.

Paul Nickerson, executive secretary of the Oregon System of Higher Education, made the remark in an address to Portland school directors.

"If the people of the state decide that all students are to be allowed to attend college, we must within the next decade double the size of every college and university," he said.

If the schools are to maintain their present enrollment, he said, they must either take the quota from those who apply first or they must raise the requirements for entrance.

Students now must maintain a C average to enter a tax-supported college in the state, he said.

"Studies show that if a high school student has less than a C average, he has less than one chance in 100 of surviving more than 13 weeks in college," Nickerson said.

## Portland's Prize Penguins Improve

PORTLAND (AP)—Portland's penguin colony appears to be rallying from an outbreak of a dread lung disease, Dr. Clifford Bjork said Wednesday.

Bjork said several penguins stricken with aspergillosis have been released from isolation pens and are gaining weight.

## Birds Take Pills

The remaining 25 penguins here are receiving tablets of amphotericin, a drug designed to fight the disease which fills the lungs of the penguins with fungus.

The disease killed 12 penguins here. A number flown to other zoos in this country and Canada also have perished.

## Over Hump

Bjork, the Portland Zoo veterinarian, said today "It certainly looks like we are over the hump for the present."

All the birds here, he said, are gaining weight. One big Emperor has put on 20 pounds in the last 18 days, he said.

The zoo here late last year captured 67 penguins in the Antarctic and brought them to this country.
