

New Miner Professor Sets Browsing Talk

Drawing from a background of experience, R. F. Mikesell, Miner Professor of Economics will give a talk on "Trade, Aid and National Security" Wednesday at 7:30 p.m. in the Browsing Room.

Mikesell, who has traveled to the Middle East and Africa on several missions for the Point Four Program is the third speaker in the winter term Browsing Room lecture series.

For a number of years, Mikesell was a consultant in the State Department on problems relating to foreign aid and trade, as well as being on the staff of several presidential commissions dealing with similar problems.

Directs Project

He is currently directing a project on United States foreign investment which is being financed by the Ford Foundation as well as serving as a regular consultant to the Pan American Union on economic problems in Latin America.

Mikesell is also in the process of completing a study on Soviet trade and aid extended to underdeveloped countries.

He received his B.A. and M.A. in 1936, and his Ph.D. in 1939 from Ohio State University, coming to the University in 1957.

Some of his other appointments include consultant to the United States Council of the International Chamber of Commerce, consultant to the Arabian-American Oil Company, and consultant to the Council of Economic Advisers.

Discussion leader will be M.D. Wattles, associate professor of economics and assistant dean of the College of Liberal Arts.

Lumber Decline Reduces Income

PORTLAND (AP)—The depressed lumber market last year cut income from timber sales on Oregon and California revested lands in Western Oregon, Virgil T. Heath, state supervisor for the Bureau of Land Management, said today.

The amount of timber sold increased but income fell from \$20,372,634 in 1956 to \$19,230,329, an average of \$28.71 a thousand board feet compared to \$36.34 in 1956, he said.

Timber sales increased from 569,779,000 to 674,421,000 feet. Heath said 833,000,000 feet will be offered for sale this year.
