

Duck Matmen Shut Out SOC

Oregon's varsity wrestlers won their third match of the season Friday night with an easy 36-0 shutout over Southern Oregon College at Ashland.

Six of the eight matches ended in falls for the Webfoots and four of the falls came in the first round. Oregon's previous victories were over Washington and Lewis and Clark.

Gary Parks, 123 pounds, Ron Conner, 130 pounds, Ken Karns, 137 pounds, and J. C. Wheeler, heavyweight, all won opening round triumphs for the Ducks.

The closest match was Jay Deering's 147-pound victory over Denny Walker of SOC by an 8-1 count. Oregon's 157-pounder Howard Timmons nabbed a 9-0 victory over Chuck Robertson in the only other full-route match of the evening.

In other matches: 167-pounder Jim Beaton of Oregon pinned Darrell Hadley in 1:47 of the second round and Webfoot 177-pounder George Krupicka pinned Andy Travis of SOC in :55 of the third round.

Jack Roche and Johnny McKay handled the Oregon matmen

during the absence of Coach Bill Hammer.

The Ducks will travel to Portland State next Thursday for their next match.

Oregon freshman wrestling squad rolled to two victories last weekend, edging Springfield 22-18 on Friday night at Springfield and topping the Bay Area Wrestlers 29-8 on Saturday night at Marshfield.

The victories were the third and fourth of the season for the Ducklings.

Heavyweight Gary Stensland won pinned his Springfield opponent in the final match of the evening to clinch the victory for Oregon. The other Duckling pin came in the 157-pound division by Lanny Holmes.

Other Frosh victors in the match were: 137-pounder Don Hoiness, 147-pounder Larry Calcano, 167-pounder Gary Maben and 177-pounder Dennis Depaepe.

The freshman squad won four matches by pins against the Bay Area wrestlers, a group composed of Marshfield and Coos Bay high school matmen.

Ed Johnson, Calcano, Maben and Stensland all won short-length victories.

Other victories by the Ducklings were made by Hoiness in the 137-pound division, Holmes in the 157-pound section and Depaepe in the 177-pound division.

The frosh grapplers next travel to Portland State to face the Vikings in a preliminary match to the varsity meeting this Thursday.

UO Bowler Snaps Marathon Record

University of Oregon student Dick Tuttle snapped the national marathon bowling record at Eugene's Empire Bowl on two counts Sunday:

1. He bowled for 60 hours and 33 minutes which is a record although short of his goal of 80 hours. He completed his lengthy session at 12:33 Sunday noon.

2. He bowled 527 consecutive games snapping the previous national record of 501 games.

Tuttle appeared very tired and suffered from blisters on both of his hands. The new record broke the standard set earlier this month by Portland's Rev. Wayne Jensen.

Gridders Schedule Ohio State Eleven For 1961 Season

Oregon's football Webfoots will meet Ohio State's Buckeyes in a regular season grid clash in 1961 the UO Athletic Department announced Saturday.

The Webfoots, who battled the Big Ten Buckeyes to a 10-7 Rose Bowl loss New Years Day, will travel to Columbus, Ohio for the clash on November 18, 1961. The game will be the next to last on the UO schedule that year preceding the Oregon State game.

The Ducks have already completed their schedules through 1960 and have scheduled inter-sectional clashes with Oklahoma and Miami, Fla., this year, Utah and the United States Air Force Academy in 1959, and Michigan and Utah in 1960.

The Webfoots in recent years have played two other Big Ten foes, losing to Iowa 34-31 and Michigan 14-0.
